CCC&TI Receives Two Awards at Statewide Conference

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute was well represented at the recent North Carolina Community College System's Basic Skills Conference & Training Academy at N.C. State University in Raleigh, N.C., bringing home two state-wide awards.

Kim Hinton, CCC&TI's ABE/GED Programs Director, was chosen from numerous nominees from across the state as the winner of the 2013 Angela Moore Trogdon Staff of the Year Award. In addition, CCC&TI student Ana Fleming was named winner of the Angela Moore Trogdon Student of the Year Award.

Each year at the conference, awards for students, volunteers/tutors and instructors are given in memory of Angela Moore Trogdon, former director of Basic Skills and Human Resource Development at Randolph Community College and Guilford Technical Community College. Trogdon lost her battle with breast cancer in 1999 and has been memorialized through these awards by donations in her name to the N.C. Literacy Association.

CCC&TI ABE/GED Program Director Kim Hinton earned her BA at Mars Hill College in 1977. After graduation, she taught English as a Second Language in Arusha, Tanzania and returned home after two years to concentrate on raising her young children. Hinton joined the staff at CCC&TI as an Adult Basic Education and GED Instructor in 1991, teaching classes at a local furniture factory. Over her 22-year career in the department, Hinton has been involved in almost every aspect of basic skills education at the college, becoming the Director of ABE/GED in 2003. In 2007, Hinton earned her Masters Degree in Higher Education with a concentration in Adult Education from Appalachian State University.

Hinton also is certified in Family Literacy, STAR Early Literacy Enterprise diagnostic assessment software and the Motheread training and curriculum development organization. She is a Certified Resource Specialist in Adult Education through the Adult Basic Skills Professional Development Institute at Appalachian State University, and she is a Learning Needs Specialist. Kim has participated in the Leadership Excellence Academy and the North Carolina Community College Leadership Program. She visited Washington State to observe the I-BEST programs and has attended many national conferences. Hinton has also been a presenter at several state and local conferences.

Hinton has been part of a collaborative effort across campus to redesign developmental curriculum for students transitioning from secondary to post-secondary education, helping to create the College Bridge curriculum.

"Kim's concern for the welfare of our students is the force that drives her to continue to learn and to continue to push the department forward in new directions. Her support for students goes beyond the classroom. Kim helps to identify students who need assistance [and then helps meet those needs.] Kim Hinton is very deserving of

being recognized as the Angela Moore Trogdon Staff of the Year Award winner."

The Angela Moore Trogdon Student of Year Award went to Ana Fleming, who is currently a student at CCC&TI working toward her degree in Early Childhood Education. She is also employed part time at CCC&TI's Family Resource Center in Lenoir.

Fleming is a native of Guatemala who came to the U.S. at the age of 17. Due to several set-backs and a growing family, Fleming was unable to enroll in traditional high school. At the age of 21, Fleming became a widow with two small children and put her education on hold to care for her children and figure out her direction for the future.

A few years later, Fleming remarried and had two more children. She says she always had the desire to continue her education but couldn't find the right fit for her situation and her family's needs. Fleming said all that changed, when she learned about CCC&TI's Family Literacy Program, a program that would help her earn her GED while also providing childcare and pre-school activities for her 3-yearold son. After getting started in the program, Fleming convinced her 18-year-old daughter to join her in her studies and both had completed their GED within six months.

After earning her GED, Fleming transitioned in the Early Childhood Education program at CCC&TI and has excelled as a student. She has earned a place on the President's List

Honduran Student Spends Summer Studying in the High Country

Ana Josse Machado, who is in the midst of a 2.5-month visit as an English student at Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute, came to the United States not sure what to expect. She quickly learned that Watauga County summers are nothing like what she was used to in her native Honduras and that Boone has a lifestyle and pace all its own.

"Boone was not what I was expecting," said Ana, who is 20 years old and a full-time college student at UNITEC university in Honduras. "I was expecting a big city."

Of course most North Carolina cities will seem small compared to Tegucigalpa, which has a population of more than 1.1 million and is the capital of Honduras. But even though Boone seems small, Ana has found many positives.

"Here there is no traffic, no taxis, no motorcycles," she said. But there is Tweetsie Railroad, which has been one of her favorite parts of her 2.5-month visit to the United States. She's also enjoyed the shopping and having a break from her busy schedule at home.

Most importantly, during her visit, she has learned about a new culture and the benefits of studying a language through immersion.

"I met Ana only after she had arrived in the U.S. and had been studying English at CCC&TI in Boone for two weeks," said Dr. Alice Lentz, Director of CCC&TI TRIO programs and a leader on several educational exchange trips to Honduras. "In the weeks that I have known Ana, I have seen her grow more comfortable with English. More important, Ana says she believes she is learning a lot."

Ana's connection to CCC&TI comes through three educational trips taken by CCC&TI students and staff to Honduras. Ana's father, who works with Heifer Honduras, was one of the hosts during the 2010 and 2011 trips. In 2012,

efforts to organize an educational exchange for Ana began. She arrived in the United States on June 26 and started her English classes on June 27. She will return home in mid-September.

Her hosts have included CCC&TI faculty and staff, who, along with welcoming her into their homes, have shown her the local attractions and provided a well-rounded experience. In addition to her experiences in Boone, including a day at the Highland Games, Ana visited Hickory, Asheville, Charlotte, Clemson University and Portland, Ore., where she hoped to see snow for the first time.

Explaining the benefits to the various participants, including staff and students at CCC&TI as well as the host families, Watauga Campus

"It's been a wonderful experience for us to learn about her culture," he said. "It's great for our children to learn that people eat different things and wear different styles of clothes."

CCC&TI Spanish Instructor Landon Pennington, who has visited 17 countries on his own educational exchanges, felt like hosting Ana was his opportunity to return the favor.

"My kids will get to see the world through her," he said, adding that he's learned new Spanish words and expressions during Ana's stay. "I think we should try to get more students involved and encourage others to host. We get as much out of it as she does."

Her experience in the English As A Second Language (ESL) classroom on the Watauga Campus has been a positive one, she said. Her hosts have seen her confidence grow, and she has especially enjoyed the group classroom setting in which multiple levels of English speakers are able to help one another and various cultures are represented.

Johnnie meticulously handled filing, helped with mailings, copied and distributed various forms and paperwork, kept an inventory of office supplies and made it her mission to remind everyone to recycle and avoid wasting resources. "She was committed to this institution and willing to do whatever was needed," said Kathy Church, Office Manager of CCR-Adult Education (formerly known as Basic Skills) who worked closely with Johnnie during her time at CCC&TI. "She was dependable and such a delight to have in our department. Just her presence made us smile."

Originally from Tennessee, Johnnie and her husband Erskine came to the Hudson area in 1951 where they made their home for more than 60 years. She had five children, 11 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren. She was a member of Fellowship Baptist Church, where she taught 2 and 3-year old children for many years.

In addition to her love for her family and her dedication to CCC&TI, Johnnie was also known for her love of parties. "Give her an invitation and she would plan to be there, any time, anywhere," said Church. Knowing how much she enjoyed

these special celebrations, her co-workers in CCR-Adult Education planned a party for Johnnie's 80th birthday and her 85th birthday. "After that, we had a birthday party for her every year."

"There was nothing that Johnnie would not do for us. She not only loved her job, she loved all of us. Johnnie was one of the most giving and caring people anyone could meet. She truly cared for all and all that knew her loved her."

The mission of Caldwell Community College & Technical Institute's Global Scholar Program is to help students become global citizens that are prepared for both academic and professional endeavors in the interconnected and interdependent world of the 21st century.

Requirements for the Global Scholar Distinction

Students can submit an application (available online) to the Global Diversity Committee for admission as a Global Scholar. To earn the Global Scholar Distinction, students must fulfill the criteria listed below. When students fulfill these requirements, they will make an oral presentation of their e-portfolio to a jury composed of members of the Global Diversity Committee.

Globally-Intensive Courses (15 credits)

This requirement is achieved by completing pre-approved courses. Students will include at least one project from each class in their e-portfolios. To receive Global Scholar Distinction, students must earn a cumulative 3.0 GPA in these classes.

· International Activities & Dialogue (minimum of 4)

This requirement is achieved by attending events such as film screenings, international fairs, on and off campus events and participation in the International Citizens Student Association (ICSA). Students must include a product related to these activities in their e-portfolios for each global activity.

· Global Experience

This requirement is achieved by completing at least A, B, or C listed below. Students will insert project-based evidence in their e-portfolios.

A. One CCC&TI approved international travel & a minimum of 20 hours service learning*

B. One CCC&TI approved national travel & a minimum of 30 hours service learning*

C. A minimum of 80 hours of CCC&TI approved service learning * Travelers must be at least 18 years old by the time of travel and/or application for international travel requirements.


