## CCC&TI celebrates 2014 graduates

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute honored a total of 653 graduates in ceremonies held Friday, May 9 at the J.E. Broyhill Civic Center in Lenoir.

CCC&TI Board of Trustees Chair Larry Taylor opened the ceremony by welcoming special guests and congratulating the graduates.

"This was a historic year for CCC&TI. We recently celebrated the college's 50th birthday. Tonight, we add you to the group of more than 14,000 curriculum graduates and 40,000 curriculum students served during the last 50 years," said Taylor. "We are proud of your accomplishments and your dedication. Congratulations to each of you."

The Class of 2014, Taylor noted, included:

- 653 total graduates
- 294 first-generation college students
- · graduates ranging in age from 18 to 68, with the average age being 29;
- 19 Dream Scholars; and
- 41 TRIO Student Support Services students.

Ann Smith of the CCC&TI Board of Trustees presented this year's Trustees' Student Awards of Merit to Elizabeth Bullock, an Associate in Art student and Kari Clossman, an Early Childhood Education major. The awards are selected based on faculty nominations for outstanding academic achievement, extracurricular activities and community service.

Presented by Vice President of Curriculum and Adult Education Margaret Hampson, the Dr. Donald Lackey Award for Excellence in Teaching was awarded to Gloria Rabun, Reading Coordinator and Instructor. The award honors a faculty member who characterizes personal dedication, concern for student welfare and academic excellence.

In his charge, CCC&TI President Dr. Ken Boham congratulated the graduates, and thanked the college's faculty and staff for their hard work.





"Tonight is a very special night for many reasons. In you, we see the embodiment of our mission and our reason for existence, student success," said Dr. Boham. "This year we have also embarked on a celebration of 50 years of excellence and I would like to pay special tribute to someone who was here when our institution was founded, the man who put excellence in our DNA, the founding president of CCC&TI, Dr. H. Edwin Beam."

To mark the anniversary, Dr. Beam was on hand to address those gathered for the evening. "There were many people that were involved in creating this institution, an institution that was different from any other in existence in our region at that time. But that's all history," said Beam, "and today is your day and you are about to become a part of that history. I hope that today has been a 'top of the mountain day' for you all. You are now a part of the history of this institution. I will add more thing: Don't stop learning."

Dr. Boham finished out the ceremony by conferring to graduates all the rights and privileges of their respective degrees and having them turn their tassels signifying their status as graduates. "As you go forth," said Boham, "you go with our sincerest wish for the absolute very best."

#### **CCC&TI Celebrates Adult High School, GED Graduates**

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute held its annual Adult High School and GED graduation exercises on Thursday evening, May 8, at the J.E. Broyhill Civic Center. During the evening's events, 305 students received their diplomas.

Larry Taylor, Chairman of CCC&TI's Board of Trustees, opened the ceremonies with a welcome and spoke briefly about the class of 2014 and its accomplishments. Taylor noted that graduates' ages ranged from 16 to 72.

"This is a major milestone in your lives and we're very proud of your achievement," said Taylor. "This ceremony is the start of a new beginning in your lives – one we hope you will find full of opportunities and success."

Beverly Jaynes, CCC&TI's College and Career Readiness Department Chair, praised the hard work of faculty and staff, then honored Sally Lackey and Sandy Burns both of whom

are retiring. She then presented the 2014 Distinguished Alumni Award to Doyle Reid, who completed his GED in 2007 after a career-ending layoff. He then completed the HVAC program at CCC&TI and now is employed as a data center technician with a Google subcontractor.

Prior to introducing the student speakers, CCC&TI College and Career Readiness/Adult Education Director Kim Hinton made a special presentation to Jaynes, who is retiring from CCC&TI after 31 years of service.

"She is well known in North Carolina as a leader in adult education," Hinton said. "She is dedicated and passionate about these students who are on the stage and the many who has come before."

Student speakers during the event included graduates Audriea McElyea, John Mittler, Victoria Poole, Joseph Ward, Tina Smith and Yareth Marquez.

Marquez, who moved to the United States from Honduras when she was 19,

acknowledged that she had made one of her dreams come true by earning her GED. She started in the English as a Second Language class at the Family Resource Center in Lenoir, then enrolled in the GED course.

"Now I see all of my hard work has made life better for my family and me," she said. "I would like to encourage everyone here to open your minds and set your own goal to finish your studies. Getting your education will allow you to guide your loved ones to better opportunities and a better life. Once you get your GED, doors will open for you to begin a professional life."

Smith took a different path to CCC&TI's GED program, and the accomplishment already has paid off. Enrolling in June 2013 and finishing by November 2013, Smith landed a management job and continues to flourish.







"I've come a long way in a short time with more confidence in myself than I've ever had," Smith said. "I want to say thank you to CCC&TI for having a wonderful program,

faculty and staff that helped me obtain a new and better chapter in my life. You can make your life better. Follow your dreams. They may take you further than you ever though."

CCC&TI President Dr. Ken Boham, who was joined on stage by Superintendent of Caldwell County Schools Dr. Steve Stone and Superintendent of Watauga County Schools Dr. David Fonseca, reminded the graduates that they are now part of 50-year tradition.

"We've been doing this for 50 years, and I hope we do it 50 more," Boham said.

Boham then closed the ceremonies, congratulating graduates on their achievements and bestowing upon them the official rights and privileges associated with their degrees. Amidst the cheers and applause of both students and audience members, Boham had graduates ceremoniously turn their tassels to indicate their official graduate status.

Friends and family members of graduates filled the 1,000-seat auditorium in support of students. A reception in honor of the Class of 2014 was held following the ceremony.

### **Malloy Receives 2014 Great Teacher Award**

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute has named Communications Instructor Matthew Malloy its 2014 Great Teacher Award winner.

The Great Teacher Award, an honor given annually to an instructor at CCC&TI, was named for the National Great Teachers Seminar, which is held in Hawaii. CCC&TI uses the award as a way to recognize excellent service among the college's faculty. Each year, nominations are made by faculty members, current students or former students for the award. The previous year's Great Teacher chairs a committee that selects a new winner.

This year's recipient, Matthew Malloy is originally from New Jersey but moved to the Morganton, N.C. area with his family while in high school. Malloy completed an undergraduate degree at Appalachian State University and then moved to New York City after graduation. While in New York, Malloy spent five years as a corporate trainer and earned his Master's Degree in Speech and Interpersonal Communication at New York University.

Malloy says he always knew that he wanted to become a teacher but was unsure of what subject to teach until starting his college education. "I couldn't initially decide on what to teach until I took my first Communication class as an undergraduate. I remember loving that class and thought, 'ok, this is what I want to teach,'" said Malloy.

Malloy said after five years in the big city, he was ready to make a change and applied for an adjunct position at CCC&TI. He landed the position and has served at the college since 2004.

As a Communications Instructor, Malloy takes on one of the most common fears among all students – public speaking. "Teaching speech, you encounter many nervous and anxious speakers," he said. "I have a few that have told me that they just CAN NOT give the speech. I talk them through it, from choosing a topic that they will enjoy talking about to helping them gain some confidence to get up and do it." Malloy said that occasionally he even hears from graduates or former students about successful presentations they've made on the job or in another classroom. He says that's what makes teaching worth the effort. "The most enjoyable aspect of teaching is seeing a student 'get it,'" he said. "It really gives me a sense of satisfaction."



Malloy says that several people have inspired him and had a positive impact on his career. "Dr. Nina Jo Moore at Appalachian State University inspired me. She really has an approachable teaching style. Ms. Sylvia Jones, who taught that first COM Class also had a big part in how I teach. Finally, I learned a lot 'on the job' from [fellow CCC&TI instructor] Christina Toy."

Malloy says he was surprised but pleased to learn that he earned the award. "I had no idea," he said. "But I was so honored." Malloy also says the award just helps to confirm that he made the right career choice. "I enjoy teaching and feel it is the profession for me. Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute has been a good fit for me."

When Malloy is not busy in the classroom, he also enjoys gardening, hiking and traveling.
