## **College Introduces Process for** New QEP – Quality Enhancement Plan

Have you seen the #QEP2 cards around campus and wondered what in the world they are?

The #QEP2 cards are the first step in a semester-long effort to generate ideas for the topic of CCC&TI's new QEP, or Quality Enhancement Plan. Faculty, staff, and students are invited to complete cards and turn them in at the reception desks on both campuses and at the drop-box in the Student Lounge in Hudson.

According to Dr. Alice Lentz, recently appointed to direct the effort, "The QEP focuses on improving student learning. It is a five-year action plan that CCC&TI is beginning to develop, based on the broad-based involvement of students, faculty, staff, and administrators."

Implementing a new QEP is a required and critical piece in CCC&TI's re-affirmation of accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Re-affirmation of accreditation occurs every 10 years.

"And so," says Dr. Lentz, "every 10 years we embrace this opportunity to innovate through a focused topic to enhance student learning. Identifying what that topic should be is our big task this fall."

CCC&TI students are invited and encouraged to suggest ideas through the #QEP2 cards, through a brainstorming session to be held on Oct. 16, and through completing a brief survey during Fall Festival. Watch for details on these events.

Faculty and staff have similar opportunities – an online survey currently open and 10 brainstorming sessions on October 16 and 20, held on both campuses.

In addition to Dr. Lentz, the QEP Leadership Team comprises eight faculty and staff members, who are Kate Benoit, DeAnna Chester, Kelly Greene, Melinda Hefner, Dale Joyner, Deborah Joyner, Jessica Raby and Mandy White.

CCC&TI's previous QEP focused on writing across the curriculum and led to the creation of the Writing Center on both of CCC&TI's campuses.

Adds Dr. Lentz, "We can't wait to see what the topic of the new QEP will be!"

## Foundation of CCC&TI Announces New Board Members

The Foundation of Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute has announced that Judge Beverly Beal and Stewart Beall have joined its Board of Directors.

A native of Caldwell County, Judge Beverly T. Beal graduated from Lenoir High School in 1964. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Wake Forest University in 1968. After serving in the United States Army from 1968-1971, where he received the Meritorious Service Medal, Judge Beal returned to Wake Forest Law School and received his Juris Doctor degree in 1974. Following his graduation, Beal was admitted to the North Carolina Bar and joined his father-in-law's practice in Lenoir. In 1990, he was elected Superior Court Judge. He became Senior Resident Superior Court Judge for Judicial District 25A in 2003. Judge Beal retired as a resident superior court judge in 2012, and was appointed an emergency superior court judge.

He previously served as co-chair of the Caldwell County Courthouse Security Committee, and has been a delegate to the State Courts Section of the Judicial Division of the American Bar Association. Judge Beal is a now a member of the North Carolina State Bar Disciplinary Hearing Commission and the Pattern Jury Instruction Committee of the N.C. Conference of Superior Court Judges. Judge Beal is a member of First Presbyterian Church of Lenoir where he has been an elder, Sunday School teacher and choir member. He is a member of the Lenoir Optimist Club. He and his wife, the former Judy Ann Harris of Lenoir, are the parents of two sons, Jonathan and Andrew, and they have two grandsons.

Stewart Beall is also a native of Caldwell County but only recently returned to the area. After growing up in Lenoir, he attended The Asheville School and later graduated from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

After college, Beall moved to Colorado where he worked as a freelance writer and editor before moving to Raleigh, where he worked for more than 10 years with GlaxoSmithKline. Beall and his family returned to the Lenoir area in January of 2014. He currently serves as Principal of the Fairfield Chair Company. Beall and wife, Elizabeth, have two sons, Henry (7) and Ethan (3).

In addition to his service on the CCC&TI Foundation Board, Beall has also worked as a volunteer with Wake County SPCA, the Literacy Council of Wake County and Brett Chavis Memorial Scholarship Fund.

# Medical Bus Available on Caldwell Campus

West Caldwell Health Council will offer its Mobile Medical Clinic Service to students, faculty and staff on the campus of Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute in Hudson. Starting Sept. 22, the Mobile Medical Clinic will park behind H Building and offer services from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each Monday when classes are in session.

Services offered include: Chronic Disease Management, Preventative Care, Dermatology, Gynecological Care, Pediatric Care, Adult Care, Minor Office Procedures, Developmental Screenings, Family Planning, Complete Physicals, Immunizations, Camp/Sports Physicals, DOT Physicals and other general care services. Though walkins are welcome, appointments can be made by calling 828-754-6850. Uninsured patients will have a sliding discount scale available to them, based on their income level.

"It is an affordable option to urgent care," said Tom McRary, West Caldwell Health Council's Chief Operating Officer. "We're a primary care physicians office on wheels. Anything you would find in a doctor's office, we're going to have it here."






# Film Screening: GMO OMG

What's on your plate? Filmmaker and concerned father Jeremy Seifert is in search of answers about genetically modified organisms (GMOs) and how they affect our children, the health of our planet, and our freedom of choice. His journey takes him to Haiti, Paris, Norway, and even the front door of agri-giant Monsanto, the largest provider of GMOs in the United States, as he poses perhaps the ultimate question about what we eat: is it still possible to reject our current food system, or have we already lost something we can't get back? GMO OMG is a timely, informative, entertaining, and ultimately insightful documentary about the question that's a growing concern to citizens around the world: who controls the future of our food?
