

Taking Care of Healthcare: CCC&TI Grad keeps the OR Humming

Hospitals, doctor's offices and healthcare facilities are all outfitted with a vast array of equipment, machines and specialized technology. This equipment helps doctors and nurses take care of us when our bodies aren't functioning properly.

But what happens when the equipment isn't functioning properly? That's when doctors call in a specialist of another sort – a Biomedical Equipment Technologist who can troubleshoot and repair the machines that are essential in today's healthcare field.

Joe Cook, a 2012 Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute graduate, is one of those technology specialists who keeps the operating room in smooth running order at McLeod Health in Florence, S.C.

Cook, a native of Lenoir, graduated from Hibriten High School in 2000 and began a career in fabricating sheet metal and welding. Even then, Cook was interested in the BMET field and enrolled in the college's program. After two semesters, he left CCC&TI due to financial reasons and continued his career in welding and fabricating.

In 2010, when Cook was laid off from his job, he decided it was the perfect opportunity to revisit his interest in the BioMed field. He re-enrolled in the program and graduated with an Associate in Applied Science in Biomedical Equipment Technology in 2012.

Cook says that returning to school after 10 years on the job was a challenge but the people at CCC&TI helped him meet that challenge and find success. "Meeting people that were in the same situation as me and building relationships was definitely beneficial," said Cook. "My professors really helped me, as well, and really cared about my education. My internship landed me the job at McLeod Regional Medical Center and that was definitely a benefit."



Cook specializes in anesthesia, surgical microscopes, Dornoch and ultrasound. He covers 25 operating room suites and anesthesia, along with the cardiovascular operating rooms. His troubleshooting skills and expertise have helped him gain the respect and trust of the operating room doctors and nurses that depend him, as well as some recognition among his peers in the field. Cook was recently recognized and featured as "Employee of the Month" in TechNation Magazine, a trade journal for medical equipment service professionals.

Cook says that his success in the field started with his education at CCC&TI. "CCC&TI gave me the opportunity to receive a degree and a quality education," said Cook. "CCC&TI gives people a chance to change their lives by getting a degree in a field they enjoy."

When Cook is not in the operating room or working on medical equipment, he enjoys fishing tournaments and spending time with his family.


Truck Driver Training Graduation


