CCC&TI Students Serve as Mentors through Caldwell Friends

Several Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute students are volunteering as mentors for local young people through Caldwell Friends, a non-profit agency that pairs Caldwell County youth with adult mentors to assist them in becoming productive citizens.

According to the organization's website, Caldwell Friends' mission is "to inspire, enrich, and enable at-risk children and youth, ages 7-14, to realize their full potential and motivate them toward positive life choices." Caldwell Friends adult mentors and mentees participate in one-to-one outings and activities, doing things they enjoy together. Both male and female volunteers ranging in age from 18 to 70 serve as mentors.

CCC&TI students Elba Euceda, Courtney Pokrandt, Meredith Triplett, Regan Tye and Emily Winkler heard about the organization and mentoring opportunities from Liz Eller, Caldwell Friends Executive Director, who regularly visits campus to speak with classes and hand out information about Caldwell Friends. "I try to visit the campus as much as I can to speak to classes and participate in events such as the spring and fall flings," said Eller. "I have met some students at these events and got to know them and knew mentoring would be a great learning experience for them."

Eller says that college students are in a unique position to be a positive influence on their mentees and also benefit from their experience as mentors. "CCC&TI students are connecting the theories and what they are learning in their classrooms to real life experiences. They are being enriched with these experiences and are growing in many areas such as communication skills, patience and just finding joy in the little things," said Eller. "Mentees' results are also very positive in many areas. The highest changes we have observed are increase in self-esteem and confidence, positive attitudes and behaviors,

passing grades, increase in GPA, more positive peer relationships, an interest in a hobby, and new found knowledge or skills. It's a beautiful journey they are taking together in a mentoring friendship."

Students involved with the program agree that they're receiving as much as they're giving through their mentorships. CCC&TI student Courtney Pokrandt is in her second year at CCC&TI and is working toward an Associate in Arts degree with plans to transfer to Montreat College to pursue a degree in psychology and mental health and eventually become a licensed clinical counselor. "I think I've helped with my student Jesslynn's self-esteem, her outlook on education and I think I've helped her be more comfortable with social interactions," said Pokrandt. "I have really gained a best friend from this experience. I have also gained the ability to communicate more effectively with kids, thanks to mentor trainings, and can now better understand the outlook that many kids have today."

CCC&TI student Meredith Triplett agrees that volunteering with Caldwell Friends is a worthwhile venture. Triplett is working toward an Associate in Science degree and is considering a career in veterinary medicine. She says she wanted to get involved with the program because she loves children. Another added benefit of the experience for Triplett is that she can gain experience that will help her figure out her own path over the course of the next few years. "I hope to be able to gain some wonderful experience from this opportunity. I really do love children and I am hoping this experience will help me figure out if I would rather pursue a career that involves children instead of animals. I am not completely sure," she added, "but I still have time to figure it out. And I can be a role model for a child who might really need one, at the same time."

Regan Tye is in her first semester of studies at CCC&TI and has been a volunteer with Caldwell Friends for almost a year. She and mentee, Malia, do a variety of things together including art projects, cooking, watching movies and playing in the snow. Tye, who eventually hopes to earn a Master's Degree in Psychiatric Social Work, says she got involved with the program to gain experience in the local community and have an opportunity to make a positive impact. "I love these kids and they have taught me so much in the months I have been working with them," said Tye. "I really feel that Malia has gotten a chance to come out of her shell. This program has given her the opportunity to be in social situations that she normally would not have been put in. And I have gained a best friend from this experience. I love that."

CCC&TI Freshman Elba Euceda is just getting started as a mentor with Caldwell Friends and was matched with her mentee, 10-year-old DeAnna, in March. Euceda hopes to transfer to a four-year university to earn a Bachelor's degree in Business. Euceda says she was actively looking for more ways to get involved both at CCC&TI and in the community when she found out about Caldwell Friends. "I emailed Liz with my information, and the very next day she called me and explained more details about the program and then we began the process," said Euceda. And although she's only getting started on her mentoring journey, she hopes that she can be a positive influence for DeAnna. "I hope to help her gain more self confidence and help her find her own dream and help her on her journey. I hope I can inspire her to be the best person she can be."

Emily Winkler, 19, is in her second semester of studies at CCC&TI and is working toward a degree in Paralegal Technology. She's been a volunteer with Caldwell Friends for almost a year. "I wanted to be a part of Caldwell Friends because I truly believe that the organization is making a difference and I wanted to be a part of that," said Winkler. "I think I have helped my student understand the importance of getting an education. And we have had a lot of fun in the process."

When asked if they think other students should get involved with Caldwell Friends, each of the CCC&TI mentors gives a resounding 'yes.' "I definitely think other students should get involved. There are so many kids in our community who just need a good friend and role model to look up to," said Winkler. Pokrandt agrees. "YES! College students make the best mentors because they are fun and energetic. And it shows the kids a little bit about college life, and helps them see that college can be a reality for anyone who's willing to work hard and take advantage of every opportunity they are given."

CCC&TI Foundation Community Campaign Begins

The Foundation of Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute held its Annual Fund Campaign kickoff luncheon on Tuesday, March 1 at the J.E. Broyhill Civic Center in Lenoir.

Featuring community leaders, campaign volunteers, and college faculty and administrators, the event starts fundraising efforts for the Foundation's Annual Fund Drive. Peg Broyhill, Chair of the Foundation's Board of Directors, offered opening remarks and welcomed the crowd of supporters. Broyhill also announced the goal for this year's campaign as \$360,000. "Each of you is a critical part of our success. You do an amazing job and your work makes it possible for us to help so many individuals," said Broyhill. Broyhill also introduced CCC&TI President Dr. Kenneth Boham, who is serving as this year's Annual Fund Campaign Chair. "We are honored and thrilled to have Dr. Boham leading this effort. With his leadership we will blast through our \$360,000 goal – our highest goal ever."



Boham expressed his gratitude to those in attendance for their work on behalf of the Foundation. "You all are the people that make this institution the excellent institution that it is. You are the difference-makers," said Boham. "Think of the thousands of lives made better by the work that you have done – it's absolutely amazing."

Deborah Murray, Vice Chair of the Foundation and Director of the Caldwell County Economic Development Commission, spoke to the group about the value of CCC&TI in the community. "Over the past several years, our county has seen an increase in available jobs, new companies locating in our area and vacant buildings put back into use. Our unemployment rate has dropped to its lowest in decades," said Murray. "We've seen the new blended with tradition and once again we have a strong and growing economy. None of that would have been possible without CCC&TI."

Broyhill introduced each of the team captains for this year's campaign. They are Dr. Kenneth Boham, Peg Broyhill, Barbara Freiman, Wayne Keller, Joan McGee, Deborah Murray, Dr. Mark Poarch, Mary Frances Sullivan, Guy Walters, Marty Waters and Barbara Weiller.

Board priorities for this year's campaign include funding for scholarships, the Dream Award Program, childcare, student emergencies, academic support and professional development.

Three current CCC&TI students who have received assistance from the Foundation spoke at the event. Ben Bolick, a Foundation Dream Scholar, earned his Adult High School diploma at CCC&TI as well as an Associates degree in Collision Repair and Refinishing Technology. He is currently working toward a degree in Automotive Systems Technology. He plans to continue his education after graduation in May and continue working toward a Bachelors degree. "I just want to say thank you to CCC&TI and to the Foundation for your help and financial assistance," said Bolick. "Hopefully one day, I will be sitting where you are and have the opportunity to give back to the Foundation and help future students."

Monica Vecchione is working toward an Associate Degree in Paralegal Technology. “When I decided to continue my education, I worried about making ends meet. But I realized how important education is and I wanted to be financially independent and a good role model for my son,” said Vecchione. Upon graduation, Vecchione will return to the workforce with plans to eventually pursue her Bachelor degree in Business or Criminal Justice. “The scholarship I received through the Foundation made all the difference in the world and I’m here with a 4.0 GPA thanks to the Foundation and all the support I’ve received at CCC&TI. I’m so grateful for this opportunity. It’s shown me the importance of giving back to the community and paying it forward.”

Broyhill recognized the faculty and staff members at CCC&TI, who kicked off their portion of the campaign in February. To date, the employee campaign has raised almost \$34,000 and employees are continuing to bring in pledges.

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's J.E. Broyhill Civic Center will welcome modern string ensemble Barrage 8 on Saturday, April 9 at 7:30 p.m.

Barrage 8 stands tall on the shoulders of an incredible string legacy. Between 1996 and 2012 Barrage gave more than 3,000 performances in 27 countries. Its contemporary string arrangements of music, both familiar and new, were presented to millions of people around the globe through its successful TV shows, DVD's, audio recordings and invigorating stage shows. Barrage 8 is the latest project from John Crozman, Dean Marshall and Tony Moore, the original creators of the hit show Barrage.

Utilizing the same energy, panache and innovative stage performance that Barrage was known for, Barrage 8 features all the instruments in the modern string family. The "8" in the name represents a re-imagining of the string octet: 4 violins, 2 violas, cello and double bass. CCC&TI to Host Immigration and Diversity Symposium

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute will host an Immigration and Diversity Symposium on Thursday, April 21 from 8:30 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. at the J.E. Broyhill Civic Center in Lenoir. The event is free and open to the public. Educators, community leaders, law enforcement personnel, medical professionals and business and industry stakeholders are encouraged to attend.

The topic for this year's event is human trafficking and will feature several speakers. Kimberly Rae, bestselling author, speaker and abolitionist, will open the program with "Immigration and Human Trafficking: Why and How Immigrants are Targeted and What You Can Do to Help." Rae lived in Bangladesh, Uganda, Kosovo and Indonesia before beginning her work writing and training on how to fight human trafficking both in the United States and worldwide. She has been published more than 200 times and has work in five languages. Her novels on international human trafficking set in India (Stolen Woman, Stolen Child, and Stolen Future) are all Amazon bestsellers, and her newest novel, Shredded, deals with trafficking in small-town North Carolina.

Heather Scavone, Director of the Humanitarian Immigration Law Clinic and Assistant Professor of Law at Elon University School of Law, will speak on "Immigration: Legal Remedies for Victims of Human Trafficking." Scavone joined Elon University School of Law in 2010 and currently serves as the Director of the Humanitarian Immigration Law Clinic, which represents refugees, asylees, asylum seekers, parolees, certified victims of trafficking and Iraqi/Afghani Special Immigrants. Since the clinic's creation in 2010, it has served more than 1,600 refugees and asylum seekers under Scavone's leadership, making it one of North Carolina's most prolific nonprofit immigration legal services providers. Prior to joining Elon, Scavone directed the statewide Immigration Legal Services program of Lutheran Family Services in the Carolinas, which provided representation to hundreds of refugees and political asylees each year. Scavone chaired the North Carolina State Refugee Office's Immigration Committee from 2005-2011, and serves as its chair currently. She is an expert on immigration legal issues affecting family reunification benefits for asylees and refugees and has been asked to present at multiple nationwide forums on this subject. In 2015 Scavone received the University's Periclean Award for Civic Engagement and Social Responsibility. She is a cum laude graduate of North Carolina Central University School of Law, where she earned a J.D., and from Guilford College, where she earned a B.A. in French. Scavone is fluent in both the Italian and French languages.

Leslie McNamara will close out the symposium with "Human Trafficking Awareness and the Department of Homeland Security Blue Campaign." McNamara is a training advisor for the Blue Campaign, where she works on human trafficking training policy and promoting the training priorities of the Blue Campaign. She came to the Blue Campaign in 2015 from United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), a part of DHS, where she had been working for the USCIS Office of Chief Counsel since 2008. McNamara began her career with DHS as an associate counsel for the Charlotte, North Carolina Field Office and was promoted to Deputy Chief Counsel for the Southeast Region in 2014. McNamara is a 2003 graduate of the University of Missouri School of Law.
