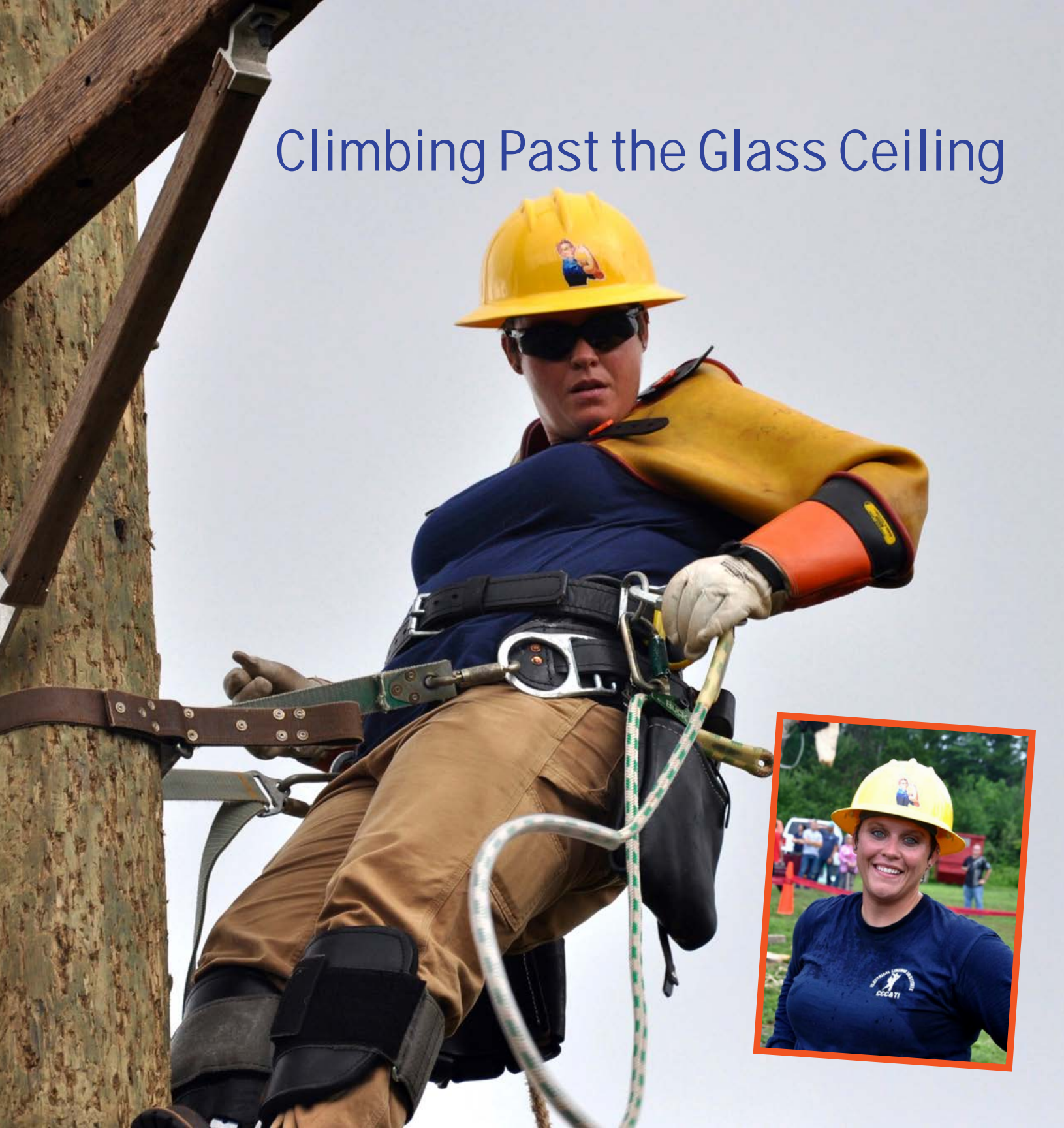

## Climbing Poles, Breaking Barriers: First Female Completes CCC&TI Electrical Lineman Program

After just a few hooks, rooftops come into view. Once you reach the crossarm, there's a slight breeze from the swaying of the pole beneath you and you can see above the tree line to the roadways, buildings, and homes dotting the landscape below. The views from the top of the poles set on Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's Electrical Lineman training grounds can be stunning. And until just a few months ago, that view had only been seen by men. Jenny Little of Conover changed all that when she became the first female to register for CCC&TI's rigorous electrical lineman training program.

Little successfully completed the program in August and, along with eight other classmates, received her certificate of completion during a ceremony held at the college's J.E. Broyhill Civic Center in Lenoir on Friday, Aug. 11. Later that day, Little demonstrated her skills on the pole yard, the culmination of many months of hard work and determination following an unexpected layoff from her manufacturing job.

Little, a 2006 graduate of Alexander Central High School, spent 10 years working for a local truck manufacturer and was laid off in 2016. After her layoff, a long-time friend who was considering enrolling in CCC&TI's Electrical Lineman program suggested that she take a look at it as well. "My friend Dale had a friend who had completed the program and gotten a great job," she said. "So we went to his house and I tried on the hooks to see how they worked and felt. I knew then, I wanted to give the program a try."

Little says that overall she had a great experience throughout the program and received a lot of support and encouragement from her classmates and instructors, alike. "I think they might have been hesitant about the idea at first," she said. "But as I started to complete tasks and reach milestones in the classroom and on the pole yard, they started coming around. I knew I'd convinced them that I was capable of completing the training when they had a women's port-a-john installed at the pole yard."

There were several factors that kept her motivated while completing the more than 500 hours of hands-on and classroom training. "I'm really competitive," she said. "That helped. I also turned 30 this year and I told myself that I was going to cut loose and get out of my comfort zone."

Little said that climbing the poles and the grueling physical demands were not the greatest challenges, but rather taking the first step toward something new and completely different. "Enrolling was the hardest part," she said. "Walking in and saying 'I'm here and I'm committed to doing this.' That was the toughest part. From there I had so much support and encouragement. I'd do it all over again. I highly recommend the program to anyone, male or female."

Little has applied for jobs with several local employers and hopes to find long-term employment in the field. Her instructors in CCC&TI's Lineman Program are confident she has what it takes to be successful. "If every student had her attitude and determination, they'd all be successful," said Instructor Dean Ford. Program Coordinator David Coffey agrees. "Jenny put forth a lot of effort throughout the course. She met every assessment standard in our program," said Coffey. "The success of our program is due to the quality graduates we are able to provide to our industry partners. This is what has sustained the program for six years and is allowing it to continue to grow."

## CCC&TI Program Director Published in Leading Textbook

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's Health Sciences Department Chair and Ophthalmic Medical Assisting Program Director Barbara Harris was recently tasked with writing the foreword for the 10th edition of *The Ophthalmic Assistant*, the best-selling and most widely used textbook for OMA programs across the nation.

Harris was asked to write the piece by one of the textbook's co-authors, Dr. Melvin Freeman, with whom she has served on the Joint Commission on Allied Health Personnel in Ophthalmology (JCAHPO) board.

"I worked with Dr. Freeman on the development of a standard ophthalmic educational curriculum for the International Council of Ophthalmology, which is largely modeled on the curriculum we developed for CCC&TI and the North Carolina Community College System," said Harris. "The Ophthalmic Assistant has been one of the main textbooks for CCC&TI's OMA program since it began in 1999. Dr. Freeman asked me to write a forward addressing its value for physician extenders for the 10th edition. He knew that I had worked as a physician assistant in ophthalmology for a number of years prior to coming to work at the college."

Harris has 40 years of experience in the healthcare field and was instrumental in establishing CCC&TI's OMA program, the first of its kind in North Carolina and the model for similar programs established at other community colleges.

In addition, Harris has served for a number of years on the JCAHPO Board, The Commission on Accreditation of Ophthalmic Programs (CoA-OMP) Board, the Consortium of Ophthalmic Training Programs (COTP) and a number of other national and statewide health sciences boards and associations. She has made presentations on a wide variety of ophthalmic topics at seminars and meetings across the United States and has been published in a number of medical journals and textbooks.

## Culinary Arts Student Brings Egg Rolls to Campus, Downtown Boone

Lee Anne Haley is wrapping up her final credit hours to complete a Culinary Arts Associate Degree at Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute. But she's already gotten a jump on her plans for the future, and students on the Watauga Campus are already benefiting from her entrepreneurship.

As the Fall Semester began, Watauga Campus students have been treated to Haley's culinary skills through her popular Egg Rollin' food truck. She parks on campus three days per week (Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday) and on King Street in downtown Boone Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Haley, who also operates S & L Catering in partnership with Scott Beshears, is excited to pursue her dreams and to give back to the school that she appreciates so much. It has also been a chance to honor her son, Moses Haley, who died at age 5 from cancer. She has dedicated her food truck business venture to Moses.

"This is so much fun for me," she said. "I love this school. My goal is to feed the students, and this is a vessel to feed them."

Among her egg roll flavors that are popular in Boone and on campus: Philly cheesesteak, mac-n-cheese, Reuben, Hibachi chicken, apple pie and many other flavors. Haley said she also offers hibachi, noodle and breakfast dishes.

"If you don't get on it and have the best idea, it's not really going to sell," she said of her food truck, which she launched in June 2017. "It's not like a hot dog stand. I want to take it to a different level. I want them (customers) to go 'wow!'"

Haley said she is thankful for the training she's received at CCC&TI, along with her talented instructors.

"CCC&TI has taken us in big time," she said, adding that Culinary Arts Instructor Robert Back has been with her every step of the way. Her Culinary Arts education has been especially helpful with the non-cooking side of her businesses, such as creating a business plan, cost control and organizational skills.

Haley, in addition to employing her own children, also has enlisted help from fellow Culinary Arts students. She hopes that having the food truck on campus can be helpful to her classmates learning about the business side of Culinary Arts.
