Makerspace, Events and Student-Friendly Environment Transform Learning Resource Center


Like most other colleges and schools, Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's Caldwell Campus has a "library" – a central space on campus that houses books and other print materials for student use. But as technology has shifted the way we interact with information, CCC&TI's Caldwell Campus Library has transformed into a dynamic, state-of-art

learning center where students can find everything from the latest 3-D printing technology, to microcomputers, to complex gaming systems. While it still has plenty of the latest books and periodicals, the library has morphed into what we now know as the Broyhill Learning Resource Center – a onestop-shop for students, employees and the community to find a variety of resources and technology tools along with an occasional hot drink and an always-welcoming environment.

The latest innovation to find a home in the Learning Resource Center is the new Makerspace. The space includes several 3-D printers, Raspberry Pi microcomputers, a Retro Pi gaming console, two sphero robots, a laser engraver, a portable public address system and more – all available to students and patrons for a variety of uses. The space is staffed by emerging technology librarians Monday through Thursday each week from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. and by appointment. The librarians can help demo the equipment, help students with class projects, and offer instruction on how to use any machine in the space. Some of the equipment is even available for students to check out and experiment with on their own.

Emerging Technologies Librarian Larry Simonds works in the LRC and has taken the





reigns in the Makerspace. Simonds is available daily to help students with projects and to demonstrate the various tools. Simonds says that the space has attracted a lot of students thus far and he has high hopes for the opportunities it will bring. "I believe it is important to show students the wide range of tools that CCC&TI makes available for them. I think that the opportunity to engage students in new ways is beneficial to the learning experience for many students," said Simonds. "Having the Makerspace in the LRC will, hopefully, bring technical and academic aspects together and give more students exposure to activities outside the scope of their individual programs. This type of hands-on experience can go a long way in helping them understand areas they may not see, otherwise."

CCC&TI's Science Club was among one of the first student groups to utilize the Makerspace, taking the term "hands-on" literally with an innovative summer project. A group of four CCC&TI students is experimenting with 3-D print technology to custom print and eventually fit a prosthetic hand for an amputee. CCC&TI Biology Instructor and Science Club Advisor Denise Williams says that the project idea came from a presentation she heard at the North Carolina Community Colleges Association of Biology Instructors. Williams pitched the idea to Simonds, LRC Director Alison Beard and the students in the Science Club. All were on board with the project.

"These students have worked on printing and assembling a 3-D prosthetic hand from publicly available models. The hand is meant to serve as a functional hand for an amputee who has a wrist but no fingers," said Williams. The students are continuing to work on the project looking for methods to heat and shape the fibers making up the connective end so that it will fit comfortably for the user. "Once they can shape the gauntlet, they can finish assembly and will have a completed hand."

Being able to print a functioning prosthetic hand is a serious endeavor, but Simonds says they've also been able to have a little fun with the new equipment as well. "We've done key chains for promotional events in the LRC, the Writing Center and Academic Support Center including a Sasquatch army, Harry Potter themed items and small objects for student scavenger hunts," said Simonds. Technicians are also working on creating a candy mold for the Culinary Arts Program that can be used to create custom CCC&TI chocolates and candies for culinary events.

But the fun doesn't stop there. In addition to the Makerspace, LRC staff members have also worked to create a comfortable environment where students can hang out with friends, participate in fun, stress-relieving activities and attend workshops on a variety of subjects from financial planning and money management to effective research and original poetry.

Library staff member Anita McRary, the LRC's resident event specialist, has organized countless activities for students and employees including: a "Pi Day" celebration that involved a number of faculty members taking a pie to the face; a Mad Hatter Tea Party complete with Flamingo Croquet, and a Valentine's Day event where CCC&TI President Dr. Mark Poarch and Instructor Matt Williams were duct taped to chairs and forced to read a children's book about llamas

to a large crowd of students and employees. And on certain occasions, you can find a plethora of craft supplies scattered about the seating areas with students working furiously on "bad art" projects and enjoying a snack or cup of coffee – activities planned and executed by dedicated LRC staff members who make it their job to keep students engaged, happy and coming back for more. Honestly, you just never know what might be happening in the LRC on any given day.

Alison Beard, the Director of CCC&TI's Learning Resource Center says that these events and innovations like the Makerspace are all part of a larger effort to help students make the most of their college experience while at CCC&TI. "We've had a great time coming up with new ways students can be creative and expand their horizons beyond books and research databases. Students are under constant pressure with so many things they HAVE to do. We give them a space where they can unwind and think about what they WANT to do," she said. "They might not have a class where they learn about 3-D printing, so they have a chance to explore that here. They might not take drawing or painting, so we have art activities here. Our hope is that all of these activi

ties give our patrons a sense of community and fun and hopefully reduce their stress levels. Ultimately, we want them to be successful and reach their goals. Seeing them smile and have fun is wonderful, but seeing them succeed makes it all worthwhile."

CCC&TI's Makerspace is located in the Tech Corner of the Broyhill Learning Resource Center on the Caldwell Campus in Hudson. The Makerspace is open Monday through Thursday from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. or by appointment for all CCC&TI students, faculty, staff and patrons.

All equipment in the Makerspace is available for demonstration. Most equipment is available for hands-on experience and some equipment is available for check out. Patrons should also note that some services require a small fee to cover the cost of materials.

Amber D. Watts, who is an alumna of CCC&TI, is an award winning exhibiting artist and active Board Member at Caldwell County Arts Council. CCC&TI Presents Fall 2018 Performing Artist Series

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's Associate in Fine Arts – Music Program will host a Performing Artist Concert Series this fall with several featured events that are free and open to all students and the general public.



Following is a schedule of events and additional details.

On Monday, Sept. 17 at 1 p.m. in the CCC&TI Recital Hall (B-100), CCC&TI's Caldwell Campus in Hudson will host local favorite Strictly Clean and Decent with special guest Reggie Harris for "Hillbilly Jazz," a celebration of Americana Roots music.

Hillbilly jazz players blend elements of blues, dixieland, ragtime, old-time, country, bluegrass, western swing, rock, and jazz to create a free-flowing style of music that's unique to the mountains. The music is highly improvisational with each selection containing many rhythmic and harmonic variations. Performers use traditional string band instruments such as guitar, mandolin, fiddle, bass, dobro, and banjo, sometimes combined with honky-tonk piano, percussion, and horns.

The Hillbilly Jazz program featuring Strictly Clean and Decent with Reggie Harris will highlight the jazz influences of Benny Goodman, Billie Holliday, Duke Ellington, Django Reinhardt, Stephane Grapelli, Vassar Clements, David Grisman and Charlie Parker.

Patrick Crouch says, "It is always amazing to hear the musical diversity in a Caldwell County jam session. You will hear the ancient tones of spirituals, blues, country, old-time, bluegrass, jazz, rock, and soul being played in casual settings. Musicians

and audiences now have access to more archival music than in any other era thanks to modern technology, leading to a renaissance in roots music."

On Wednesday, Oct. 24 at 1 p.m. in the CCC&TI Recital Hall (B-100), CCC&TI's Caldwell Campus in Hudson will host the Appalachian State University Trumpet Choir under the direction of Dr. James Stokes, Jr.

The Appalachian State University Hayes School of Music Trumpet Choir is a student ensemble that presents original and arranged compositions in concert on the ASU campus. A variety of styles are performed including traditional and jazz works. Music from the Renaissance to the 21st Century are performed. The Trumpet Choir has performed for National and International conferences and for schools and communities across North Carolina.



On Thursday, Nov. 8 at 1 p.m. in the CCC&TI Recital Hall (B-100), CCC&TI's Caldwell Campus in Hudson will host the Warren Wilson Gamelan Ensemble performing the music of Java and Bali in Indonesia.

Gamelan, a percussion-dominated ensemble consisting mainly of gongs and metallophones, is the major orchestra of Indonesia (especially in Java, Bali, and Sunda) and perhaps the most popular Asian ensemble in the world. There are over 150 sets of gamelans in the United States.



The Warren Wilson College Gamelan Ensemble was established in the spring semester of 2011 under the direction of Dr. Kevin Kehrberg. The ensemble introduces students to Indonesian gamelan performance, and it focuses on Central Javanese style, Sundanese gamelan degung style, or Balinese gamelan angklung depending on the semester. In addition to on-campus concerts, the group delivers school programs and performs at local venues and music festivals throughout the area.

On Tuesday, Dec. 11 at 12:15 p.m. in the CCC&TI Recital Hall (B-100), on the Caldwell Campus in Hudson, CCC&TI will present the CCC&TI Chorus Concert. An encore performance will be presented on Thursday, Dec. 13 at 12:15pm at St. James Episcopal Church in downtown Lenoir.

All events are free and open to the public.

CCC&TI Hosts Representatives from EducationNC and the John M. Belk Endowment

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's Caldwell Campus hosted a visit from EducationNC and the John M. Belk Endowment on Aug. 29. The visit is part of a statewide effort involving EducationNC and various nonprofit organizations to visit all 58 community colleges.

The visit began with a tour of the new Career Connections area in F Building, where students can access employment and career planning resources. The group then toured health sciences program areas, including Nuclear Medicine, Radiography, Sonography and Ophthalmic Medical Assisting. During the tour, the group learned about career opportunities for CCC&TI health science graduates, as well as the success they've had with accreditation exams.

Next, the group traveled to the Transportation and Public Services Center to learn about the Truck

Driver Training program. A representative of Merchants Distributors Inc., Caldwell County's largest private employer, told the group about the growing need for welltrained truck drivers and the benefits the company has experienced partnering with CCC&TI. The tour then went on the road as truck driving instructors took members of the group for a ride in CCC&TI's tractor-trailer training trucks.







After lunch on campus, provided by the JEBCC Catering Group, the group concluded its day with a visit to the Automotive Systems Technology program and a demonstration of the Dynamometer. Several enjoyed the simulated experience of driving a race car on an 1/8-mile drag strip.

Throughout the day, college leadership as well as county eco-

nomic development leadership shared with the group the many ways that CCC&TI respond to local workforce development needs and helps with economic development efforts.
