### **CCC&TI Students Receive Scholarships**

Two Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute students were recently awarded the State Employees' Credit Union "People Helping People" scholarship to cover cost of tuition, books and college-related expenses. Students Lindsey Hamlett and Caley Nia Lamprecht were selected to receive the \$5,000 award from the SECU Foundation.

Both Hamlett and Lamprecht were accepted into and began CCC&Tl's Associate Degree Nursing Program this fall. In addition to their studies, both have also been heavily involved with a number of healthcare organizations in the region.

Hamlett says she was inspired to enter the nursing field after her own experience as a cancer patient in 2016. "Being a patient, being loved as well as treated with compassion by numerous nurses during my treatment is one of the major contributing factors of my desire to become a registered nurse," she said.

Over the past 8 years, Hamlett has already gained experience in the healthcare field. She has worked with Alzheimer's and dementia patients at an assisted living facility and worked with an organization offering outpatient opiate addiction treatment. Hamlett says these experiences are what have fueled her drive to succeed in the Nursing program. "I want to help those in need, those that cannot help themselves and treat all my patients with compassion and dignity," she said. "A higher education will allow me to accomplish this goal and this scholarship will allow me to focus on my studies."

Caley Nia Lamprecht was adopted at the age of four from a rural village in Yiwu, China and grew up in Boone. Lamprecht says that she faced many challenges when she began her education as she worked to learn English and assimilate to a new culture. With encouragement, support and guidance from teachers, family and peers, she was able to overcome those challenges and graduate with honors from high school and begin her studies at nearby Appalachian State University. Her goal is to earn her Associate Degree in Nursing at CCC&TI and become a certified nurse midwife.

Lamprecht has also been involved with several community organizations including volunteer work with Hope Pregnancy Center, the Hunger and Health Coalition and a special needs program through her church. Lamprecht has gained valuable job experience in the healthcare field as a certified nursing assistant at Foley Center at Chestnut Ridge and at Blue Ridge Pediatrics and Adolescent Care. She says that this scholarship will be a great help to her as she works to achieve her goals. "Receiving this scholarship enables me to make progress toward my degree and to one day take part in bringing children safely into the world as a midwife," she said.

The SECU Foundation established this two-year scholarship program to assist North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS) students in achieving academic success. Recipients considered are students who best exemplify the membership philosophy of credit unions, "People Helping People," and have demonstrated leadership, excellence of character, integrity and community involvement.

# CCC&TI Compass Student Uses Art To Share Her Story and Celebrate National Literacy Month

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's Adult Compass Class is celebrating Literacy Month throughout September. To help spread the word, the students designed a bookmark featuring art by one of their classmates, Heather Higgins.

Higgins is originally from Brunswick County but moved to the Lenoir area with her family a few years ago. She's been a part of CCC&TI's Compass Class since 2015. She loves to draw and paint and has used her talents to help with various Compass Class projects during her time at CCC&TI, drawing illustrations for posters, fliers and cards.

When she sat down to draw the illustration for the Literacy Month bookmark, she drew a dinosaur reading a book. But not just any book, the dinosaur she drew is reading her book – a book she wrote and illustrated when she was just 11 years old. The book is titled "The Foal That Doesn't Have a Family." It's a story inspired by Higgins own experience through Foster Care and adoption. Higgins says she enjoys art and drawing because it is a good stress reliever and for her, a lot of fun to explore new ideas and experiment with different techniques.



Having Higgins artwork on the bookmark is also meaningful for her classmates in CCC&Tl's Compass Class. "Heather is a very talented student and artist. Many of our students enjoy expressing themselves through art. It is important for us to encourage and provide opportunities for students as much as possible across all areas," said CCC&Tl Compass Class Instructor and Special Populations Director, Ginny Navarro. "The class collectively came up with the idea for the bookmark and Heather was able to express that design through her art."

In addition to the bookmark, Compass students and Adult Education students have also decorated a special bulletin board near their classrooms on the Caldwell Campus. Students add a leaf with their name to the board each time they complete a book. Both projects are part of a broader effort to emphasize literacy and the importance of reading. Navarro says that both projects have been effective. "The bookmark and the bulletin board have really motivated students to read during National Literacy Month. Our class on campus has read over 170 books so far this month," said Navarro. "We have students who have never been interested in reading now asking us 'When are we going to the library?"

CCC&TI's College Compass Program is designed for adults with intellectual/developmental disabilities or traumatic brain injuries. The program helps students acquire basic skills to become more independent and self-directed and to meet and manage community, social, work and personal adult responsibilities. 
