CCC&TI Foundation, President Launch Mini-Grant Initiative

The Foundation of Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute, along with CCC&TI President Dr. Mark Poarch launched a new Mini-Grant Project initiative this year. The project allocated \$15,000 and allowed college faculty and staff members an opportunity to pitch their innovative ideas for a chance at funding via Academic Support dollars raised by the Foundation.

In total, 14 proposals were submitted and seven projects were selected to receive funding through the program, allowing for a wide range of ideas to come to fruition for students and the community.

"The proposals exceeded my expectations and also provided insight into how we can enhance what is already happening in the classroom," said Dr. Poarch. "We want to encourage innovative projects that will help enrich student learning. I enjoyed the opportunity to hear from our faculty and staff and was truly impressed by their enthusiasm and commitment to student success through new and engaging approaches."

Dr. Poarch says he plans to continue to offer funds annually through this process. "I look forward to seeing what will come to the table next year," he said. Applications for the 2019-2020 academic year will be available in the fall.

Following are the recipients of this year's grants and a brief description of their projects:

Joshua Marsh Making the Nano, Macro with Sphero-Mini

Chemistry Instructor Joshua Marsh requested mini-grant funds to cover the cost of Sphero-Mini robots that will allow students to investigate three-dimensional nano-scale interactions between atoms and compounds. By using Sphero-mini robots, students will be able to experiment with instruments that exhibit nanoscale molecular interactions. These tools are new and previously unapplied to the field of Chemistry. "Viewing interactions between atoms and molecules has previously been reserved to simulations and science fiction. However, with advances in robotics and innovative applications we can now allow students to explore nanoscale interactions in the macroscale," said Marsh. "We are excited to provide these new technologies to chemistry students at CCC&TI. To our knowledge, we are the first and only current educational institution utilizing these tools for instruction in Chemistry." CCC&TI's Chemistry department is also collaborating with the IT Department to allow students to utilize the Sphero-mini robots to write programs for chemistry applications for their cap-stone projects.

Shari Brown and Melissa Darling NC: My State, My Purpose, My Future

Family Literacy Program Director Shari Brown and English as a Second Language Director Melissa Darling proposed a series of educational field trips for adult education and family literacy students that will help them learn more about historical and present-day North Carolina in terms of geography, wildlife, government and visit destinations across the state that these students might not otherwise be able to visit. Possible destination for these educational excursions will include sites across the state that will tie-in with students' studies of the Serafina book series such as the Biltmore House, North Carolina Zoo, Linville Caverns, and Tuttle State Forest. Students will also be able to visit the Catawba Science Center and various local sites and business throughout the county.

"Most of our students are financially unable to travel outside of Lenoir. As instructors, we are able to teach our students knowledge about our state and community through books, virtual tours, and guest speakers, but we lack the funds necessary to offer experiences outside the classroom," said Brown. "With the CCC&TI Mini-Grant, we'll be able to show our students their awesome state and community in ways that many of them would not be able to experience, otherwise."

Mandy White **“Resilience” Community Movie Screening and Panel Discussion**

Early Childhood Education Director Mandy White and CCC&TI’s Early Childhood Education Department will use their mini-grant funds to host a community screening of the documentary “Resilience: The Biology of Stress and the Science of Hope” with a panel discussion with area Early Childhood professionals. The event will be presented in collaboration with both Caldwell and Burke County Smart Start programs and the Enola Group, WNC-based nonprofit organization that oversees services for infants, young children, adults, expectant mothers and children in Caldwell, Burke and Alexander Counties.

Lisa Helton – Gaming Lab

Network Administrator Lisa Helton was awarded grant funding for a state-of-the-art gaming lab for student use. The space will include software and hardware for game development and creation. Students will be able to explore the world of gaming design and programming, artificial intelligence concepts, game security, e-commerce and entrepreneurship while also developing soft skills, such as teamwork and social interaction with peers. The concept could also lead to future development of courses in these technology areas.

Anita McRary – Crafty Academics

Library Assistant Anita McRary requested funds for “Crafty Academics,” which is an extension of the Learning Resource Center’s popular student engagement activities. Workshops and activities such as “Grab-N-Go Learning,” the Night OWL Event and Book Club activities are held throughout the academic year. Funds for peripheral supplies for these events will allow students to engage in hands-on activities, present opportunities for students to interact with faculty and staff and will encourage student participation in an atmosphere of fun learning.

Denise Williams – Science Club Public Access Trail System Project

Biology Instructor and Science Club Advisor Denise Williams requested funds to help support a collaboration with CCC&TI’s Science Club and Foothills Conservancy of NC to improve and finish development of a 4.3 mile, multi-use trail system at the Rock Creek Property near South Mountain in Burke County. The project will give club members a hands-on, work-based learning experience and will also provide an outdoor recreation option for the region.

“This project will help increase awareness of the club’s ongoing conservation efforts,” said Williams. “And thanks to the generous support of the CCC&TI Foundation, club members will be able to purchase protective gear and proper tools for this project.”

Dr. April Cline – Enhancing Student Success through Evidence-based Practice

CCC&TI Nursing Program Director Dr. April Cline will receive funding to cover the cost of professional development for nursing instructors. Specifically, instructors will be able to attend the 2019 Assessment Technologies Institute Summit. The training will enhance instructors’ teaching and remediation strategies to improve student retention and help better prepare nursing students for their licensure exams.

CCC&TI Will Launch Human Services Technology Program in Fall 2019

To meet the needs of local health care providers, Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute (CCC&TI) has added two new degree programs that will train social and human services assistants, as well as mental health professionals.

Beginning in Fall 2019, CCC&TI's Caldwell Campus in Hudson will offer 2-year Associate in Applied Science degrees in Human Services Technology and Human Services Technology with a concentration in Mental Health. Approved by the CCC&TI Board of Trustees on Jan. 16, the programs prepare students for entry-level positions in institutions and agencies that provide social, community and educational services, as well as at mental health treatment centers.

Driving the addition of the programs is a growing demand for human services and mental health workers, CCC&TI President Dr. Mark Poarch said. Specifically, Caldwell UNC Healthcare's new mental health facility in Lenoir and Appalachian Regional Healthcare in the High Country need workers in these areas, Poarch said.

"This is a direct response from us to meet the needs of our local industry," Poarch said. "I feel really good about what we're doing to support our community with these programs."

CCC&TI Presents Spring 2019 Performing Artist Series

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's Associate in Fine Arts – Music Program will once again host the Performing Artist Concert Series this spring with several featured events that are free and open to all students and the general public. Following is a schedule of events and additional details.

On Tuesday, Feb. 12 at 1 p.m. in the CCC&TI Recital Hall (B-100), CCC&TI's Caldwell Campus in Hudson will host the Lenoir-Rhyne College Singers.

The LRU College Singers is a select chamber ensemble drawn from the members of LR's flagship choral ensemble, the A Cappella Choir. The College Singers perform music from a variety of genres and time periods from Medieval chant to contemporary collegiate a cappella. In addition to performing regularly as part of A Cappella Choir programs, College Singers participates in "A Lenoir-Rhyne Christmas", the LR Choral Festival, and a variety of banquets, alumni events, and community functions throughout the academic year. The College Singers are directed by Ryan Luhrs, LR Director of Choral Activities and assistant professor of music.

On Monday, Feb. 25 at 1 p.m. in the CCC&TI Recital Hall (B-100), CCC&TI's Caldwell Campus in Hudson will host guest lecturer Dr. Melisse Brunet.

Mélisse Brunet is one of the six conductors selected from 161 applicants for the Linda and Mitch Hart Institute for Women Conductors at The Dallas Opera. She was the Assistant Conductor of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Philharmonic for two seasons and guest conducted with them five concert series. She also regularly guest conducts five French professional orchestras, and made her guest conducting debuts in January with Symphoria in Syracuse, N.Y. Mélisse believes that each stage appearance is an opportunity for sharing her passion with the audience during concert talks and by the creative interaction of the musicians and the audience throughout the performance. Her passion for sharing has always been transposed through her teaching and mentoring of younger musicians. In July 2016, she was named the Director of Orchestral Activities at Appalachian State University where she is conducting all the symphonic concerts, operas and musicals. Brunet will lead a discussion on the role of a female conductor in modern classical music.



On Tuesday, March 19 at 1 p.m. in the CCC&TI Recital Hall (B-100), CCC&TI's Caldwell Campus in Hudson will host guitarist Derek Gripper.

Derek Gripper is a classical guitarist who has taken a unique path. As a South African classical musician, he found himself limited by the music of the traditional classical guitar. So, he went on a journey through different musical styles, returning always to the guitar to find ways of bringing what he learned onto the instrument. In 2012 he completed a ten year project to understand and translate the music of the West African kora (21 string harp) virtuoso Toumani Diabate to solo guitar, resulting in two critically acclaimed albums and an international concert tour.



On Wednesday, April 17 at 1 p.m. in the CCC&TI Recital Hall (B-100), CCC&TI's Caldwell Campus in Hudson will host the Firecracker Jazz Band.

In hundreds of performances since 2003, Firecracker Jazz Band has played everywhere from street corners, speakeasies, jazz festivals from coast to coast, dance halls, Bonnaroo and the Kennedy Center. Based in Asheville, N.C., these six musicians revitalize traditional jazz with unbounded energy and pay homage to the pioneers of early 20th Century Jazz, including that of Dixieland and New Orleans. Firecracker Jazz Band strives to carry on the traditions forged by such greats as Jelly Roll Morton, Louis Armstrong & Bix Beiderbecke. April is Jazz Appreciate Month and a free Firecracker Jazz Band concert is the perfect way to celebrate.
