CCC&TI Celebrates 2022 Graduates

After a two-year hiatus from hosting its traditional graduation ceremony, Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute returned to the J.E. Broyhill Civic Center in Lenoir on Saturday, May 7 to celebrate more than 1,000 graduates from its Caldwell Campus and Watauga Campus during two ceremonies.

CCC&TI Board of Trustees members Joel Carroll and Ann Smith opened the ceremonies by welcoming special guests, congratulating the graduates and listing highlights from the last year.

The Class of 2022, the welcome noted, included:

- 1,016 total graduates, including 461 first-generation college graduates
- Graduates ranging in age from 15 to 65, with the average age being 25
- 14 Dream Scholars
- 24 student athletes
- 24 TRIO/Student Support Services graduates

Smith also presented this year's Trustees' Student Award of Merit to Melody Reeves. The award is selected based on faculty nominations for outstanding academic achievement, extracurricular activities and community service. Reeves graduated at the ceremony with an Associate in Applied Science in Medical Office Administration.

The commencement speaker, Lenoir native and CCC&TI graduate Emily Thomas, shared her story of being on the same stage 16 years earlier and the challenges she faced to get there. She acknowledged the CCC&TI instructors, some of whom were sitting in the audience, who helped keep her on track when she had thoughts of quitting school.

"This institution changes lives. I know, because it changed mine," Thomas said.

Thomas earned her Associate in Arts at CCC&TI and went on to earn a Bachelor of Science in Communication at Appalachian State and a Master of Arts in Communication studies at UNC-Charlotte. She is a policy analyst for EducationNC and also teaches Communication courses at CCC&TI.



In her closing remarks, she encouraged everyone in the audience to consider furthering their education and to not let fear hold them back.

"The great thing about the North Carolina Community College System is that it was designed for students to enter college regardless of their educational background," Thomas said. "The colleges meet people where they are and provide them with an education that will transform their lives and the lives of their family. Just as today's graduates have been transformed."

In his charge to graduates, CCC&TI President Dr. Mark Poarch thanked the college's faculty and staff for their hard work and congratulated the Class of 2022 on a job well done. Poarch also spoke about returning

to a formal graduation after two years of outdoor, on-campus ceremonies due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It feels so good to be here in this place in person for the first time in three years," Poarch said. "You are here and on this stage in spite of a global pandemic. ... That truly is a remarkable accomplishment."

Poarch challenged the graduates to take the lessons learned the last two years and forge ahead into whatever comes next.

"Students, if you can persevere through a pandemic and perform at this high level, you can succeed in whatever lies ahead," he said. "As



you move on, go with confidence and let this situation and your success set the stage for life's next step. As you leave this place, go with the same sense of fearlessness, inspiration and boldness that got you through the pandemic and to this graduation stage."

Cobras Make Appearance in NJCAA World Series, Finish 3rd in the Nation

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institutes's Cobra Baseball Team made it all the way to the National Junior College Association District Three World Series in Greeneville, SC following a championship 2022 season.


The Cobras won both the Region 10 Championship and Mid-Athlantic District Championship to advance to the national competition as the topranked team.

Ultimately, the Cobras fell to 5th-ranked Dallas College-Eastfield in the Semi-Final Elimination game on May 31 with a final score of 11-1. It was the second elimination game of the day for the Cobras, who earlier in the afternoon bested St. Cloud in a 4-0 shut-out to advance to the semi-final game.

The Cobras ended the season 49-9 and third in the nation for the division.

Larson Chosen for 2022 Academic Excellence Award

When Lyric Larson arrived at Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute and Caldwell Early College High School five years ago, she didn't know how to log on to a computer or complete assignments online.

In 2022, she graduated with an Associate in Arts degree from Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute with a 4.0 grade point average. She attributes her success, and the ability to overcome the challenges she faced in the beginning, to the teachers, mentors and advisors she met along the way.

"Without the amazing support system (both) schools provided me, I doubt college would have been possible," Larson said of attending CCC&TI and Caldwell Early College High School. "I feel like that's a big part of the culture here – supporting people, making them feel like 'you can do it."

Larson, who grew up in Collettsville and was homeschooled, was honored April 7 at the CCC&TI Board of Trustees meeting as the 2022 Academic Excellence Award winner, CCC&TI President Dr. Mark Poarch presented her with a medal, an award plague and a letter of congratulations from former N.C. Community College System President Thomas Stith, III. She is one of 58 students statewide to receive the annual award, one from each of the North Carolina's community colleges.



She was nominated by one of her instructors and chosen

for the award by a committee of CCC&TI faculty and staff. Listed among the reasons for her selection were her academic achievements, volunteer service and her enthusiasm for education.

"Lyric loves to learn and has clear academic gifts," said Matt Williams, an instructor of English and humanities at CCC&TI. "I sensed qualities of leadership, service and character in Lyric. ... I believe she is headed toward long-term academic and life success."

Larson has been active on campus, including being chosen as a CCC&TI Ambassador, a member of the CCC&TI Film Club and working as a Writing Center tutor. At Caldwell Early College High School, she participated in Art Club, Interact, Rotary, the Environmental Club and Beta Club. Her community involvement includes Junior Appalachian Musicians (JAM), Blue Ridge Energy's Leadership Track, God's Closet childcare manager, volunteering for the Caldwell Chamber of Commerce, Girl Scouts of America and the Granite Falls Library mural team.

Adding to her accolades, Larson was awarded the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Foundation College Scholarship. She was one of 100 high school seniors nationwide to receive the award.

Larson graduated from CCC&TI in May having completed 75 hours of college credit, in addition to the Caldwell Early College High School program. She plans to study Film and Television Production at Western Carolina University this fall.

CCC&TI SGA Receives Top Campus Recognition




CCC&TI Students Take 2nd in Statewide High-Altitude Balloon Competition


A group of Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute (CCC&TI) and Caldwell Early College High School (CECHS) students have reached new heights - literally.

The group, named Kármán Seekers, competed this spring in the statewide NASA/NC Space Grant Community College High-Altitude Balloon Competition at Catawba Valley Community College (CVCC) in Hickory, falling short of a first-place finish by only a few points.

CCC&TI tied with Wake Tech for second place in the overall competition, with Nash Community College topping the competition rankings. At 92,205 feet, CCC&TI's team was only 1,500 feet short of the top altitude in the competition. The team won the award for Closest to Predicted Landing Site at approximately 15.5 miles. The balloon landed near the Alamance and Chatham County line in wooded area. The next closest competitor landed their balloon 26 miles from the predicted site.







The approximately 6-month competition consisted of several components ranging from the design of the balloon payload and launch system to community outreach. The main goal of the competition was to design, build and launch a payload equipped with sensors and cameras, carried by a helium balloon, to the edge of space (20 miles up) and hopefully, recover it.

The Kármán Seekers, named for the Kármán Line that represents the barrier between space and Earth's atmosphere, was one of only five teams that were able to complete this mission. The team successfully designed, built, launched and recovered the payload with photos and video from the entire flight. The balloon and payload, flying from CVCC to the Pittsboro area, reached nearly 17.5 miles in altitude and was recovered completely intact. The total flight time was approximately three hours and 146 miles east of the CVCC campus.

The team consisted of seven students from CCC&TI and CECHS. Team members included two co-captains: Zach St. Pierre and Brianna Campbell. Other team members included: Charles Hagaman, Daniel Ward, Lila Bennett and Sarah McLean. Cameron Williams, a student from CECHS, also participated as a student helper. The faculty mentors for the team were: Lucas McGuire, Denise Williams, Mandy Williams and Mel Rhoney.

"This project provided a great way for the students to work together as a team and showcase the wide-ranging skill sets that they have acquired while at our institution," said McGuire, CCC&TI's Program Director for Biomedical Equipment Technology and Electronics Engineering Technology. "I couldn't be prouder of the students' effort and performance, as well as the support of faculty and administration."

The team win and trip to space extended beyond the competitors and advisors. As part of the project's community outreach, CCC&TI's library staff hosted an art contest for students. The winning entry, designed by Matthew Boyle, decorated the balloon's payload with a colorful logo to go with the return label in case the team couldn't find it upon landing. It was a campus wide effort, McGuire said.

Congratulations to the Kármán Seekers and their hard work in this competition.




J.E. Broyhill Civic Center announces Upcoming Showcase of Stars Events

CCC&TI Student Athletes Earn Academic Honors

Nine Student-Athletes from CCC&TI Named to NJCAA All-Academic Teams for 2021-2002 Academic Year

Nine student-athletes from Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute were named to the National Junior College Athletics Association's All-Academic teams for the 2021-2022 academic year. Student-athletes are eligible to earn academic honors by the NJCAA for achieving an overall GPA of 3.60 or higher with at least 24 semester hours completed for the academic year. The criteria for the three All-Academic teams are listed below:

- NJCAA All-Academic First Team: 4.00 GPA
- NJCAA All-Academic Second Team: 3.80-3.99 GPA
- NJCAA All-Academic Third Team: 3.60-3.79 GPA

Ashlyn Castle (softball) and Easton Rhoney (baseball) were honored as members of the NJCAA All-Academic First Team. Zoey Boston (softball) and Jacob Bebber (baseball) earned NJCAA All-Academic Second Team honors. Juliana Aponte (softball), Kiara Dewy (softball), Mackenzie Johnson (softball), Scout Nichols (baseball), and Kaylee Redwine (softball) were NJCAA All-Academic Third Team honorees.

Nationwide, 2,852 student-athletes garnered NJCAA All-Academic First Team honors after achieving a 4.0 GPA. 3,322 student-athletes were named to the NJCAA All-Academic Second Team while 4,221 student-athletes received third team recognition.

Eighteen Student-Athletes from CCC&TI Named to the NJCAA Region 10 All-Academic Team for Spring Semester 2022

For the Spring 2022 semester, 18 student-athletes from Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute were honored by NJCAA Region 10 as All-Academic Team selections. To be named to the Region 10 All-Academic team, student-athletes must participate in a sport that competes during the spring semester (baseball, basketball, beach volleyball, golf, softball, tennis, and track and field) while achieving a 3.0 grade point average and passing at least 12 credit hours.
