The presentation took place at the J.E. Broyhill Civic Center in Lenoir during the monthly Board of Trustees meeting. The event included a special meal and comments from fellow board members and CCC&TI President Dr. Mark Poarch. Taylor was first appointed in July 1992 and was elected chairman of the board in 1999. Student Receives Harold F. Coffey Scholarship

The Foundation of CCC&TI recently presented Lana McCall of Hudson with the Harold F. Coffey Scholarship for 2022-2023. McCall is working toward an Associate in Science degree as well as an Emergency Medical Technician certificate.

McCall is a 2022 graduate of South Caldwell High School, where she participated in Beta Club, the Health Occupations Students of America Club, Citizens of the World Club, Student Ambassadors Club and varsity women's golf. She also has volunteered with Wheelhouse Sports Academy and North Catawba Optimist. McCall plans to transfer to Appalachian State University to pursue a bachelor's degree in biology and continue her education to become a Physician Assistant.

Established by the Coffey Foundation in memory of Harold Coffey, the scholarship is merit-based and provides \$2,500 annually to a graduate of Caldwell County Schools or a graduate of a certified Caldwell County home school who does not qualify for a Pell Grant. The graduate must also have a minimum GPA of 3.5 and have demonstrated civic or community involvement. The scholarship provides funds to cover the cost of tuition, books and supplies for a student who enrolls in either an Associate in Science or Associate in Applied Science program of study at CCC&TI.

Global Students Club Hosts Ukrainian Speakers

While the world watches a war raging on television and social media, a group of students and employees at Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute were able to gain a new perspective on it.

English Instructor Suzanne Shaut invited Appalachian State University Computer Science Assistant Profes-

sor Andrew Polonsky, his wife Viktoriia Kovtun and his father Sergii Polonsky to speak on the Watauga Campus Oct. 4. Hosted by the Global Students Club, the event focused on a discussion about the ongoing war in Ukraine and how it has affected Ukrainians living in the United States.

Polonsky spoke about the history of Ukraine, specifically Ukraine's history of conflict with Russia. He said that a main reason for the current war is each country's differing government systems and issues that date back centuries. The speakers also talked about their family and the impact that the war has had on them.

Kovtun, a former CCC&TI student, said that when the news about the Russian invasion broke, she checked on her family still in Ukraine and they were hiding in their basements. She said she hopes Ukraine wins the war and that afterward there will be more diversity and people wanting to immigrate to her home country. She also believes the support and media awareness from the United States has been helpful and has "saved a lot of Ukrainian civilian lives."

Event participants also learned about Ukrainian culture, specifically its infrastructure and cuisine. Polonsky said Ukrainian architecture mirrors a lot of Poland's building design and engineering. In regards to the cuisine, one of the most famous dishes in Ukraine is borscht, a soup made with beets, cabbage and other vegetables.

"I am thankful for the opportunity CCC&TI offered for us to hear a first-hand account of the current crisis and its immediate impact on their families in Ukraine, as well as learning about their culture and strong family values," said Diane Mazza, Coordinator of Student Life and Engagement at CCC&TI. "I have learned so much about Ukrainian history through this presentation."

The Watauga Campus Global Students Club hosts meetings every Tuesday from 10:40 a.m. to 11 a.m. in the Academic Support Center (W-460). It's open to all students and provides opportunities to learn about cultural diversity and global issues as well as sampling foods from around the world.

The WWC Gamelan Ensemble • Wednesday, Nov. 9 at 1 p.m. CCC&TI Recital Hall (B-100) • Caldwell Campus

Gamelan is a traditional instrumental ensemble of Indonesia mostly made up of metal percussion instruments.

The WWC Gamelan Ensemble, founded in 2011, is an introduction to Indonesian gamelan performance. It performs different styles of gamelan from Java and Bali depending on the semester, with nearly all of the repertoire coming from the transcriptions and arrangements of Burhan Sukarma and Dr. Han Kuo-huang. The ensemble is open to all students, and auditions are not required. Out of respect for the gamelan instruments and the spirit believed to inhabit them, musicians in Indonesia remove their shoes before playing and are careful to not step over the instruments. Members of the WWC Gamelan Ensemble also observe these performance practices.

CCC&TI hosted its second Caldwell Cuisine event of the semester on Oct. 6 at J.E. Broyhill Civic Center in Lenoir. A long-term component of the college's popular Culinary Arts program, the dinner events had been suspended due to the COVID-19 pandemic.



Caldwell Cuisine allows culinary students to gain hands-on experience planning, cooking and serving a meal for the community. The events are a key component in translating classroom knowledge to a real-world experience.

The delectable dinner consisted of five Greek-inspired courses that were served and cooked by CCC&TI's Culinary Arts students. When guests first arrived, they were seated at decorative tables while musicians played Greek music softly in the background. The servers, also Culinary Arts students, offered beverages such as tea and beer.

The first course was dolmades, which contains lamb, rice, tomatoes, pine nuts and fresh herbs. Following the dolmades, students served Greek salad, shish kabobs, rice, and for dessert, baklava.

During dinner, guests chatted with each other and gave their compliments to the chefs. A survey was provided on each seat to rate each dish and provide feedback, a valuable learning tool for the students. At the end of the dinner, the Culinary Arts instructors brought out the students to take a bow and commended them on their hard work.

CCC&TI will host another Caldwell Cuisine on Nov. 17 at 6 p.m. at the civic center. The menu for the final Caldwell Cuisine of the semester will feature Latin American foods including empanadas, Mexican-braised chicken, stewed pinto beans and more.
