

CCC&TI Student Work Selected for Permanent Art Collection

Four art pieces by Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute students will become part of the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS) permanent collection in Raleigh.

Since 1998, the NCCCS office has sponsored an annual exhibition of artwork submitted by the 58 community colleges. The system is now moving to a permanent collection that will illustrate the work, mission and passion of North Carolina Community Colleges. Beginning in March 2015, the art collection will be on display throughout the six-story Caswell Building located at 200 W. Jones Street in Raleigh.

Among the works representing CCC&TI is *Blue*, a two-color intaglio print made in the Printmaking 1 class by Sahasa Ben-Avari. Ben-Avari is a second-year AFA Fine Arts major who was just awarded The Linda C. Waters Fine Arts Scholarship.

Kenzie Chasteen's work *Untitled Drawing*, a graphite on paper that was made in the Drawing 1 class will also be on display. Chasteen is a home-schooled high school student who is taking art classes at CCC&TI.

Joe Hollar's work, *Student working at Printing Press*, will also be a part of the permanent collection. Hollar is a second-year AFA Fine Arts major. His work is an intaglio print made of fellow art student Braxton Beaver working at the college's printing press.

Braxton Beaver's work will also be included in the collection. Beaver is an advanced AFA Fine Arts Major. His work *Sef Portat* (intentionally misspelled) is a combination of a monotype with intaglio print. The print must be pulled twice to gain the desired impression.


Tom Thieleman, Visual Arts Program Director at CCC&TI, chose each of the four artists from among his students and asked them to create pieces based on the System Office's theme for the collection, "Community College Students."

"Each student was selected based on their creativity, craftsmanship and work ethic," said Thieleman. "I'm proud of the work they've created. Each one is a great representation of the talent and artistry that exists among our students."

Queenie and Mr. Brown: CCC&TI Employee Illustrates Children's Book

Shannon Brown's official title is Director of Counseling and Advisement at Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute. Now, thanks to a recently published children's book, he can also add artist and illustrator to his resumé. Brown has illustrated "Queenie and Little Joe: A True Story about a Young Boy and His Pet Chicken," a self-published book by Dr. Joe Sinclair, an educator and N.C. native.

The book, about a small boy growing up on a North Carolina farm with his well-behaved pet chicken, Queenie, has been nominated for several Association for Library Services for Children (ALSC) Awards, including The Robert Sibert Medal and the Caldecott Medal.

Although this is Brown's first commercial project, he says that he's been interested in art since he was a child and the fascination never left him. "I'd make scary paper maché masks and all kinds of puppets and sculptures and contraptions from left-over gears and switches from my dad's scrap supplies. He was a diesel mechanic for years, and there were always interesting pistons and oddly shaped pieces of pipe and metal around the house," says Brown. "Dad was good with a torch and welder, so I was used to seeing beautiful and functional things develop out of what looked like a pile of junk. It was magic really."


The magic of art, along with much encouragement from his mom, led Brown to take art classes in high school and eventually discover the field of art therapy. "My high school art teacher, Margaret Martine, taught me about the therapeutic, life affirming power of art. She was the first person to tell me there was such a job as an art therapist. From there I went on to study art education and psychology at UNCG, and Creative Arts in Therapy at Hahnemann University in Philadelphia."

Brown says that through the years he's done some freelance work and several mural projects for family and friends but only recently began thinking about the possibility of illustrating and publishing his work. When his sister, a local educator, shared an opportunity with him that she'd learned about through a presentation by "Queenie" author Sinclair, he felt the time was right to pursue the idea. "My sister encouraged me to contact Joe and show him some of my work. I figured two nudges from the universe about illustrating a book, all at the same time, probably merited a response. Joe already had the experience of producing several books, at least one of which was a successful children's book. So, I took my sister's advice and contacted him."

The partnership was a success and not only led to the completion of "Queenie" but also to collaboration on a future book, this one about a wooly worm. Brown says he's proud of the work he's done with Sinclair and is honored to have the finished book nominated for the ALSC awards. "Karen Lowe, a retired past president of NC School Library Media Association nominated 'Queenie' for these awards and while it may not win, it's still pretty awesome for it to get nominated by someone of Karen Lowe's caliber and experience," says Brown.


J.E. Broyhill Civic Center Presents Dr. Elliot Engel, "The Vanderbilts: All of Them"

Funds Available to Cover GED Testing Costs at CCC&TI

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's College and Career Readiness Division has announced that funds are now available to cover the student fees for both the GED® high school equivalency tests and practice tests.

The GED test is administered via computer and has four sections: Reasoning through Language Arts, Mathematical Reasoning, Science and Social Studies. Funds are available to cover the cost of each section of the test. In addition, CCC&TI offers free practice testing for students who wish to gauge their aptitude and test their readiness prior to taking the actual GED exams.

“Our Adult Education classes are free to all students, but there is a cost involved with completing the testing that can sometimes prevent a student from finishing,” said Kim Hinton, Adult Education Director. “This money will enable us to remove one of the many barriers that our Adult Education students often face.”

Registration for GED® preparatory classes is ongoing. Students must attend Adult Education Orientation and Assessment prior to enrolling in a class. On the Caldwell Campus, the orientation is scheduled Monday through Wednesday and both morning and evening hours are available. On the Watauga Campus, orientation sessions are scheduled for Tuesday and Thursday mornings.

After completing the Orientation and Assessment, students meet with an advisor, receive placement test scores, discuss educational goals and set up a class schedule. After this initial advisement session, students may immediately begin preparing for their high school equivalency testing. All orientation, assessment and prep classes are free.

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's Global Diversity Committee and Student Government Association will host a film series this spring with several events open to the public.




On Thursday, Feb. 12, the film "A Better Life" will be shown at the J.E. Broyhill Civic Center in Lenoir at 7 p.m. The film chronicles the story of a gardener in East Los Angeles as he struggles to keep his son away from gangs and immigration agents while also trying to give his son the opportunities he never had. The film is rated PG-13. The screening is free and open to the public.

"A Better Life" will also be shown on the Watauga Campus on Thursday, Feb. 19 in Room 112 at 5:30 p.m.

On Thursday, March 26 at 5:30 p.m. in Room 112 on the Watauga Campus and on Tuesday, March 31, at 7 p.m. at the J.E. Broyhill Civic Center, the film "Who is Dayani Cristal?" will be shown. The film tells the story of a migrant who found himself in the deadly stretch of desert known as "the corridor of death" and shows how one life is impacted by immigration policy. As the real-life drama unfolds viewers see this John Doe, denied an identity at his point of death, become a living and breathing human begin with an important life story. The screening at the Civic Center is free and open to the public.

On Tuesday, April 14 at 3 p.m. in B-104 on the Caldwell Campus and on Thursday, April 16 at 5:30 p.m. in Room 112 on the Watauga Campus, the film "The Other Side of Immigration" will be shown. The Learning Resource Centers on both campuses will sponsor a panel discussion following the film. Based on over 700 interviews in Mexican towns where about half the population has left to work in the United States, "The Other Side of Immigration" asks why so many Mexicans come to the United States and what happens to the families and communities they leave behind.

Medical Bus Back on Caldwell Campus

Starting Monday, Jan. 26, West Caldwell Health Council will offer its Mobile Medical Clinic Service to students, faculty and staff on the Caldwell Campus in Hudson. The Mobile Medical Clinic will park behind H Building and offer services from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each Monday when classes are in session.

Services offered include: Chronic Disease Management, Preventative Care, Dermatology, Gynecological Care, Pediatric Care, Adult Care, Minor Office Procedures, Developmental Screenings, Family Planning, Complete Physicals, Immunizations, Camp/Sports Physicals, DOT Physicals and other general care services. Though walk-ins are welcome, appointments are encouraged and can be made by calling 828-754-6850. Uninsured patients will have a sliding discount scale available to them, based on their income level.

A change from last semester: Employees covered by the 80/20 and 70/30 state health plans can visit the Mobile Medical Clinic for the equivalent copay as your Primary Care Provider. Previously the Mobile Clinic charged the Urgent Care copay. This lower-cost option isn't available to employees who are on the CDHP plan, but they can still use its services for the previously higher copay.
