

## **CCC&TI Seeking Entries for Literary and Arts Magazine**



## CCC&TI's Justin Butler Named Concerts Director for Chapel of Rest

Justin Butler, Director of Music Programs at Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute, was recently named the new Concerts Director for the Chapel of Rest in Happy Valley beginning in 2017. Butler is an award-winning multi-instrumentalist, composer and educator who serves at CCC&TI and as teaching artist at Appalachian State University. He has served on the music faculty at Milligan College in Johnson City, Tenn. for 10 years. He has performed at major venues and festivals across the U.S., Canada and Japan.

The Chapel of Rest is a fully restored Episcopal church, originally built in 1887 in the heart of Happy Valley in Caldwell County. The Chapel of Rest Preservation society was created in 1984 to preserve the historical integrity of the Chapel and to maintain the building and grouds. A concert series was also inaugerated that year and has been ongoing since, offering a spring and fall concert in the acoustically perfect sanctuary.


## **Presidents Attend State Board Meeting**



### **Upcoming PE Class, Walking for Fitness**

Get ready for leaf-peeping on foot this Fall! Walking for Fitness (PED 120-300C), a late-start second session class, has been added to the schedule.

This is a 1-credit hybrid course that presents weekly opportunities to socialize and improve your fitness through walking. The hybrid portion involves a few self-guided personal walks at your choice of time/day and location (plus journals, online activities, and a brief presentation the last day of class). The class will visit local walking trails for 1-hour class group walks on/near campus and at the Lenoir Greenway. A few outings will be farther from campus and class will meet for 2.5-3 hours those days to allow travel time to these scenic destinations (near Blowing Rock, Blue Ridge Parkway).

Students will receive 1 credit for this class. Faculty and staff are also invited to register. (Employees will need approval for a longer-than-usual lunch break on days when class travels away from campus.) You may audit or register for credit, just indicate which you prefer at the time of registration.
