Middle Schoolers Compete in First Annual Mike Bradshaw Math Competition

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute hosted the first Mike Bradshaw Middle School Math Competition Friday, March 31 on the Caldwell Campus in Hudson. Seventh and eighth graders from Collettsville, Happy Valley, Gamewell, Granite Falls and Kings Creek flexed their

math muscles in a formal competition, followed by get-to-know-you activities and free pizza in the CCC&TI gym.

The top performing team in both the seventh and eighth grade divisions was Granite Falls Middle School. Individual awards were given for first, second and third places for seventh and eighth grade divisions as well.

In its first year, the competition is named for former STEM Department Chair Mike Bradshaw, who retired from CCC&TI in 2015 after 37 years as an educator. He was present for the event and handed out trophies at its conclusion.

From CCC&TI to the Super Bowl

From the halls of Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute to the world's biggest stage – Super Bowl LVII at State Farm Stadium in Glendale, Ariz. – James Tatum continues to add new chapters to his incredible comeback story.

Tatum's path to success began at South Caldwell High School, where he spent four years on the football team and experienced homelessness as a youth. Terrie and Bill Johnson, a local couple, took Tatum in and gave him the opportunity to reach his potential.

"They believed in me at a time where many people were questioning me," Tatum said. "I'll always be in debt to them."

Thanks to the support from South Caldwell coaches, teachers, staff and the Johnsons, Tatum continued his education at CCC&-TI. He was the first in his family to get a high school diploma and the first to attend college. At CCC&TI he earned an associate degree, and now he's ready to graduate again. Tatum is currently studying at Grand Canyon University, working toward a bachelor's degree in sports management. He plans to graduate this fall.

"There's no mistake that the foundation of what I'm doing now was built during the years I was at CCC&TI," he said.

CCC&TI allowed Tatum to explore different career options and helped him build a strong work ethic. TRIO, a program at CCC&-TI that supports first-generation college students, was another important part of Tatum's success. Since his graduation, the TRIO staff members continue cheering Tatum on.

"James is one of the most determined individuals I have ever known, and when he sets his mind to something, he goes for it," CCC&TI TRIO Director Emily Garrison said. "We helped him with course advising, tutoring, obtaining campus employment, but more than that, we were a place he could land any time during the day."

It was at CCC&TI that Tatum discovered his passion for sports, working with the basketball teams and building relationships with current head men's basketball coach Jamison McIver and former coaches Matt Anderson and Richie Covington. Tatum credits their support for his pursuit of a degree and career in sports. Though he's still working toward the degree, he has a head start on his career.

In 2021, Tatum created The Gauntlet, a sports podcast that focuses on NFL content such as the draft, free agency and other news. What started as a hobby quickly became another rung on the ladder to his sports career. Media company Sideline Sports Network LLC, picked up The

Gauntlet podcast and assigned Tatum to cover Super Bowl LVII in February. He has since been named President of Recruiting and Events for

Sideline Sports, and is now preparing to cover the NFL Draft in Kansas City in late April.

His dream job is to be a reporter covering the Philadelphia Eagles, a goal he remembers discussing with Garrison during his time at CCC&TI.

"Once you think you've made it, that's when you will fall," Tatum said. "I know I'm at a place in my life where I cannot afford to fall. So I will keep going.

"I am simply somebody who wanted something more than what I had, and that is still true today," he said.

For CCC&TI students and the staff who supported, Tatum is an example of how hard work and education can help someone achieve their goals.

Associate Athletic Director Presents at National Conference



CCC&TI's Associate Athletics Director Maggie Murray was recently selected to present at the National Junior College Athletic Association Convention in Charlotte. Murray presented on "Student First, Athlete Second: Ensuring Success Starting with Academics."

Murray was selected by the National Council and one of only six athletic administrators to present at the week-long convention. Her presentation focused on prioritizing academics for student-athletes and understanding how it affects the immediate, gradual, final outcomes for student-athletes in their GPA and transferring to 4-year colleges.

"I am so honored that the NJCAA National Office asked me to present on supporting students in the classroom. We call them student-athletes for a reason...they are a student first and an athlete second," stated Murray. "Every day it is our job to make student-athletes' experiences the best it can be when they are a Cobra. We want to do that on and off the field."

CCC&TI's Toyaz Solomon Named NJCAA Division One All-American Honorable Mention

The NJCAA Division One Men's Basketball Committee released their All-American selections on Tuesday, April 4. CCC&TI's Toyaz Solomon was an honorable mention selection, marking the first time in program history at the division one level that a Caldwell player has achieved All-American recognition.

Solomon, the sophomore from Enfield, NC, averaged 14.9 points per game and 9.6 rebounds per game. He also recorded 43 blocked shots and 15 steals on the season. Solomon scored a season high 27 points in the first game of the season against Motlow State. He scored 20-plus points in seven games and recorded eight double-doubles on the season, despite missing seven games in December with an injury.

In March, Solomon was named Region 10 Player of the Year, Defensive Player of the Year, and first-team All-Region. He helped lead the Cobras to a 22-5 record, including a 10-2 mark and regular season first place finish in Region 10 Division One. Solomon has signed a National Letter of Intent to attend UNC-Asheville.

Mental Health Technician - Online Course

CCC&TI will offer an online Mental Health Technician course from May 15 to July 28. This course provides students with the knowledge and skills for safe, therapeutic care to patients with mental and behavioral health needs in an effective and ethical manner. Upon completion of the program, students will be prepared to take the American Association of Psychiatric Technicians (AAPT) Level 1 certification exam and qualify for entry-level positions within the special mental/behavioral health care programs. The course covers topics such as patient rights and documentation, trust and communication in health care, safety in the workplace, common psychiatric disorders, and chemical dependency and its effects. Topics will include: History of mental health care, identifying normal growth and development, importance of trust and communication in health care, proper safety in the workplace, chemical dependency and its effects, common psychiatric disorders, proper documentation for patients and understanding and respecting patient rights. Nurse Aide Refresher – Caldwell Campus

Nurse Aide I – Watauga Campus

CCC&TI will offer a Nurse Aide I class on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., May 31 to July 27 on the Watauga Campus in Boone. The Certified Nursing Assistant Class prepares students to provide personal care and perform basic CNA skills for the elderly and other adults through classroom, lab, and clinical practice. During clinical, Nurse Aide students gain experience by performing previously learned caregiver skills on residents in skilled nursing facilities. The CNA, who successfully completes all course requirements, receives a certificate of CNA class completion and becomes eligible to sit for the North Carolina State Nurse Aide I competency examination. Students must successfully pass the two-part written and skills portions of the state competency examination before being listed on the North Carolina Nurse Aide Registry with the Division of Health & Human Service Regulation and then they can be employed as a Certified Nurse Aide (CNA). The cost is \$203 and the textbook is \$12.50. For more info or to register, call 828-297-3811.

BioWork Process Technician

CCC&TI will offer the BioWork Process Technician course Tuesdays and Thursdays, 5:30 p.m. to 9 p.m., from June 1 to Aug. 10 on the Caldwell Campus in Hudson. The course will combine classroom lecture and online instruction. The total cost for the course is \$262, which includes textbook. The BioWork Process Technician course provides basic preparation for process technician jobs in bioprocess manufacturing, pharmaceutical manufacturing and chemical manufacturing. The course will include understanding the role of a process technician, safety, quality processes, measuring process variables, transforming matter, process technology (including processing equipment and plant utilities), controlling the process, maintaining sterile processes and growing living cells. 
Attached to the balloon was a payload containing communication equipment indicating that the balloon ascended to approximately 70,000 feet before the payload parachuted down near Drexel.
