Mid-Atlantic District Champions! Cobra Volleyball: 2023




Cobra Volleyball Wins NJCAA Division III Mid-Atlantic District Championship; Advances to National Champtionship Tournament

Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's women's volleyball team defeated Butler County Community College 3-2 in a five-set thriller on Saturday, Oct. 28 to win the National Junior College Athletic Association Division III Mid-Atlantic District Championship and advance to their first national tournament appearance in program history.

Caldwell, champions of Region 10, traveled to Butler, Pa. to face the host Pioneers, who were Region 10 champtions, in a winner-takeall, best-of-five match.

Caldwell (21-5) dropped the first set 25-22, despite holding an early 9-5 advantage. The Cobras tied the set at 22, but Butler (18-6) scored the final three points to take the early 1-0 lead.

In the second set, Caldwell led 14-13 before finishing the set 11-4 to draw even with the Pioneers at one set apiece. The third set saw the Cobras build a 17-8 lead; however, Butler



would battle back to tie the set at 20. Caldwell would win the next point to lead 21-20, but the Pioneers scored the last five points of the set to take a 2-1 advantage.

Set four saw Caldwell fall behind 7-1. Facing elimination, the Cobras would battle back, eventually tying the match at 16. The back-and-forth set would continue with Caldwell getting their first lead at 21-20. Butler tied the match at 21 before the Cobras closed on a 4-1 run to win the set and force a decisive fifth set.

Caldwell dominated set five, jumping out to a 3-0 lead. Butler would close the deficit to 4-2 but would not get any closer as the Cobras won the set 15-4.

Laney Craig led Caldwell's offensive attack with 32 kills over the five sets. Emma Grace Hiatt had 24 assists to go along with Josie Chappell's 20. Defensively, Emily Ramirez had 26 digs while Chappell finished with 12. Greenleigh Gleason added five solo blocks.

By winning the Mid-Atlantic District, Caldwell earned an automatic birth to the sixteen-team NJCAA Division III Volleyball National Championships in Cedar Rapids, Iowa November 9-11. Twelve district champions earn automatic berths to the National Championships. Four other teams will receive at-large selections. The NJCAA made a live announcement on Thursday, Oct. 31 that CCC&TI will be the seventh overall seed in the Division III Volleyball National Tournament and will face tenth seeded Dallas College-Brookhaven in the tournament's opening round on Thursday, November 9 at 12PM (EST) at the Alliant Energy PowerHouse Arena in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

CCC&TI Foundation Celebrates New Dream Award Recipients

With dreams of careers in fields from culinary arts to engineering to healthcare to education, a group of students got one step closer to achieving those dreams at the Foundation of Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute's annual Dream Award ceremony at the J.E. Broyhill Civic Center in

Lenoir on Wednesday, Nov. 1.

The Dream Award, which guarantees tuition for local students to attend CCC&TI upon graduation from high school, was presented to 41 students from Caldwell and Watauga counties who were nominated and chosen while in sixth grade.

Participants must be future first-generation college students who have demonstrated academic achievement and civic involvement, and who have the potential to succeed. The pro-



gram, which is funded through private donations to the Foundation, has presented awards to 1,446 students since its inception in 1989.

CCC&TI President Dr. Mark Poarch opened the ceremony by welcoming the students, their families and guests. "I would like to be one of the first to congratulate these students on being selected as Dream Award Recipients." Poarch also welcomed honored guests including CCC&TI trustees, local government officials, public school officials, school board members from both Caldwell and Watauga Counties, as well as the Foundation Board members and donors. "We could not do this without your support. Thank you."

Deborah Murray, Vice Chair of CCC&TI's Foundation Board, shared the criteria for the Dream Award as well as the history of the program. "As of tonight, and thanks to generosity of our donors, the Foundation of CCC&TI will have awarded 1,446 Dream Awards since the program was started in 1989." Murray recognized Dr. Tony Deal who brought the program to CCC&TI and who was in attendance at the event.



Dr. Dena Holman, Vice President of Student Services at CCC&TI, encouraged recipients to make the most of the opportunity. "With the promise of college in sight, it's now time to start setting goals and dreaming about your future. CCC&TI is here to support you and help you realize those dreams."

Holman then introduced guest speaker, CCC&TI Alumna Susan Neel, a 1991 Dream Award recipient from Hudson Middle School. Neel, a second grade teacher at Dudley Shoals Elementary School, shared the impact that the award had on her as a student. Neel earned a 2-year degree at CCC&-TI and then transferred to Appalachian State University where she earned her Bachelor's Degree in Elementary Education and later a Master's Degree in Elementary Education. "The Dream Scholarship helped me to not carry a load of student debt after the culmination of these years of college," said

Neel. "January 2024 will mark 21 years in teaching for me. It all began when I received the Dream Scholarship just like you. Take advantage of all the opportunities that CCC&TI will offer to you. This will serve as a base of your future learning." Neel also encouraged students to set goals, work toward them, establish clear objectives and stay focused and motivated. "Again, congratulations on receiving the Dream Scholarship Award and welcome to the club," she said. "The teachers that nominated you saw something special in you. Now it is your job to go out and make them proud and make this world a better place."

Public School Partners Dr. Katrina McEllen, Caldwell County Schools Assistant Superintendent for Educational Program Services, and Dr. Leslie Alexander, Superintendent of Watauga County Schools were on hand at the ceremony and offered their congratulations and support to



this latest group of Dream Scholars and encouraged students to make the most of the opportunities provided by the program.

To conclude the ceremony, Dream Award recipients were recognized and presented with a framed certificate while CCC&TI TRIO Director Emily Garrison read comments from their Dream nominations completed by educators at their schools. Each recipient also introduced themselves and shared their career goals with those in attendance.

A special reception for students, families, and attendees was held following the ceremony.

In Memory: Alicia Hartley

July 8, 1971 - September 21, 2023.

Alicia Hartley served as a Library Technician in CCC&TI's Caldwell Campus Learning Resource Center for more than 15 years. She passed away following a medical episode on Sept. 21..The following eulogy was composed by CCC&TI Colleague and friend, Matt Williams, and delivered during the remembrance services for Alicia on Monday Sept. 25.

I think I can speak for all of us when I say that losing Alicia was quite a shock. I had enjoyed friendly chatter with her on the college's breezeway on the way to my 8 a.m. class on a Thursday morning and she was gone before my class was done.

Alicia was a fun coworker. We must have had a thousand friendly conversations over the last decade about whatever piece of homemade jewelry she was wearing that day or the book she was currently reading. She had a general sense of mischievous fun and an excellent sense of irony. If anything was ever a little offbeat or a little off kilter, you could see in Alicia's face that she had registered it and was making a note of it in her head. Her eyes would sparkle as if to say, "Well, okay then..."

I did a search through my college email and reviewed a decade's worth of emails where I basically said, "I know I am asking at the last minute, but I would really like to bring my class to the library," and Alicia replied, "Sure, bring them in!" followed by a smiley face.



Alicia was the kind of person who would remember the details of the conversations you would have with her later. It was easy to have little running jokes with her, and I know she was spot on making book recommendations for many of us at the college and letting us know when the library got a book she suspected we would enjoy.

She knew the students who were patrons in the library too and cared about them. Whenever I would email the faculty and staff for nominations for our student ambassador program, she would always nominate some folks and have a nice word to say about her nominees.

A couple of years ago, I had taken a class to the library and had them working at the computers close to Alicia's desk. Class had ended, and I was hanging around talking to a young man who was repeating the class for the fourth time, and we were talking about this mixture of personal and practical concerns: his dad was sick, his manager kept calling him into work extra shifts, he was frustrated by in-text citations, and he had chosen to write about "Schindler's List," which was a pretty depressing paper topic. I think I was listening pretty well and pretty empathetically, but I felt myself being pulled into the spiral of concerns he had laid out, and I was a bit speechless. I had almost forgotten Alicia was right there, but she started talking about her own experience of coming back to school as an adult and not being sure whether she could do it, about being exhausted and uncertain at times. She had made it, though. It was so genuine, nonjudgmental, and encouraging. I was grateful to her.



Sometimes it feels hard to reconcile the life of work with our spiritual lives, but I believe the Bible when it says that our main mission in this life is to love God and love one another. In so many ways, Alicia actively showed her love for us at the college, and we loved her.

As I have sorted out Alicia's passing these last few days, what I keep thinking is this: she was always kind to me, and I laughed with her more times than I can count. At the college, we are going to be sad about her passing and miss her, but I am grateful for the uncomplicated nature of this sadness. We will mourn and miss her, but the sadness will be undercut by all of the happy memories she has left with us.

CCC&TI Launches New Fast Track Health Career Programs for Spring

In response to community and industry needs, Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute is adding two new health related training programs launching in January, 2024.

The programs, Medical Laboratory Assistant and Pharmacy Technician, are both fast track training courses designed to help students train for health careers and qualify for available jobs in the industry in just a few short weeks. Both courses begin in January and are open now for enrollment.

The Medical Laboratory Assistant program is a 320-hour program, which includes 120 clinical hours with a focus on the role of the Medical Laboratory Assistant in healthcare settings such as hospitals, medical clinics, research laboratories and more.

This course is scheduled to begin in January 2024 with classes on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. Financial Aid may be available for those who qualify.

The Pharmacy Technician program is 16-week course that prepares students to sit for a national certification exam and to earn the Certified Pharmacy Technician credential (CPhT). With the certification, students qualify for employment in the pharmacy setting. The classroom portion of the program will take place online with an in-person lab each week on the Watauga Campus in Boone.

The course runs January 15 to May 10, 2024 with seated labs scheduled for Thursday evenings from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. on CCC&TI's Watauga Campus in Boone.

The cost of registration for these course is \$203 each. Additional costs include textbooks, uniforms, supplies, a background check, drug screening, and other supplies, Financial Aid may be available for those who qualify.

CCC&TI Celebrates IMPACT Institute

The grant-funded program was a partnership with local employers that focused on providing students the skills and certifications needed for entry-level advanced manufacturing careers and

scholarships to cover the cost for related CCC&TI programs of study. The program was designed to address the shortage of qualified advanced manufacturing workers while connecting local students with the training needed for high-paying manufacturing jobs in the region.

A reception was held at CCC&TI's Broyhill Center for Advanced Technologies that included tours of the facility and a chance to see students at work in the labs. Following

the reception, a dinner was held at the J.E. Broyhill Civic Center in Lenoir to recognize the employers and community partners who helped make the program a success. CCC&TI President Dr. Mark Poarch welcomed those in attendance and recognized IMPACT's inaugeral sponsors BEMIS Manufacturing









Company, Woodgrain Millworks and Fleet Genius of NC (formerly Bakers Waste Equipment) for their support of the program.

Attendees also heard from several special speakers at the event. NC Vice President of Economic Development, John Loyack, spoke on successful partnerships between North Carolina's advanced manufacturing employers and community colleges across the state. CCC&TI IMPACT Graduate Meredith Wilson shared her student story and how the program led her to a successful career with local employer FleetGenius. Charlie Milling, NC Community College System Regional Youth Apprenticeship Coordinator, talked about the positive impact of apprenticeship programs for students and families across the state.

Derek Gripper is a classical guitarist who has taken a unique path. As a South African classical musician, he found himself limited by the music of the traditional classical guitar. So, he went on a journey through different musical styles, returning always to the guitar to find ways of bringing what he learned onto the instrument. In 2012 he completed a 10-year project to understand and translate the music of the West African kora (21 string harp) virtuoso Toumani Diabate to solo guitar, resulting in two critically acclaimed albums and an international concert tour.



On Wednesday, Dec. 6 at 1 p.m. in the CCC&TI Recital Hall (B-100), the Caldwell Campus in Hudson will host The CCC&TI Chorus as they present "A Winter Festival of Vocal Music."




Cobra Cares Award Winners - September


